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A Revision
of the
Genus *Eucerceris* Cresson
(Hymenoptera: Sphecidae)

Introduction

The wasp genus *Eucerceris* was erected by E. T. Cresson in 1865. In 1939 the writer published his first extensive paper on this genus (Scullen, 1939). A second paper with a revised key to the known species (Scullen, 1948) was published later describing additional species. Since the above publications appeared, the writer, through the assistance of grants from the National Science Foundation and the Graduate School of Oregon State University, has been able to study types in this country and in the museums of Europe. Furthermore, in more recent years a vast amount of additional material and information has been secured through the field work of the writer and numerous other workers. Many new species have been discovered in Mexico. The distribution data and information relative to known species have been greatly extended by recent workers.

Structural Characters

The genus *Eucerceris* which is limited to North America may be distinguished from the more widely distributed genus *Cerceris* by the following structural characters:

(1) The 3rd submarginal cell of the fore wing is more or less inflated in *Eucerceris* and the second submarginal cell is not always petiolate as in *Cerceris*.

(2) The hair lobes of the male clypeus are less distinctly separated from the other setae of the lower face and are never "waxed" as is so true of *Cerceris*.

(3) The terga of *Eucerceris* show a more or less distinct mesal depression in which the punctation is crowded. This depressed area is inclined to be darker than the convex surfaces of the terga.

(4) The male pygidium of *Eucerceris* differs markedly from that of the female and shows distinct lateral denticles.

The genotype of *Eucerceris* was designated as *Eucerceris fulvipes* Cresson by V. S. L. Pate (1937, p. 27).

Biological Studies

Very little is yet known about the biology of most species of *Eucerceris*. In the writer's 1939 publication *Eucerceris flavocincta* Cresson was recorded as collecting *Dyslobus lecontei* Casey at Breitenbush Hot Springs in Marion County, Ore. Bohart and Powell (1956) reported *E. flavocincta* Cr. as carrying in an undescribed species of *Dyslobus*. Linsley and MacSwain (1954) report *E. ruficeps* Scullen using the weevils *Dysticheus rotundicollis* Van Dyke and *Sitona californicus* Fahrens in the sand dune region east of Antioch on the lower San Jaquine River. Krombein (1960a, b) reported *E. triciliata* (now known to be *E. pimarum* Rohwer, Scullen, 1965) as taking the weevil, *Minyomeres languidus* Horn near Portal, Ariz. *E. rubripes* Cresson was found by Mont A. Cazier collecting a species of weevil, *Peritaxia* sp., 2 mi. NE. of Portal, Ariz., July 28, 1961.

Acknowledgments

Eucerceris angulata Rohwer, 1912, p. 326.—Scullen, 1939, pp. 17, 18, 56-58, figs. 34, 35, 36, 48, 51, 75, 89, 108, 122, 134b, 156; 1948, pp. 157, 158, 180; 1951, p. 1011.

The female of *E. angulata* Rohwer was described by Rohwer in 1912. The male was described and the female redescribed by Scullen (1939).

In later years both males and females have been taken by several collectors in numerous locations as listed below.

TYPE.—The holotype female of *Eucerceris angulata* Rohwer is at the American Museum of Natural History. The type female is from Lower California, between San Jose del Cabo and Triunfo. Collected by 'Albatross.'

FEMALE.—Length 13 mm. Body black with creamy white markings, legs largely ferruginous; punctation average; pubescence short.

Head slightly wider than the thorax; black except for large eye patches, most of the clypeus, the area between the antennal scrobes, and a large patch back of the eye, all of which are creamy white; clypeal border medially depressed with an angular denticle between the medial and lateral clypeal lobes, above and more mesad there is a smaller denticle, and a cluster of bristles on the meson; a small convex elevation on the medial clypeal lobe; mandibles with one prominent medial denticle and a smaller one more basad; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except for a band on the pronotum, a band on the scutellum, the metanotum, a large patch on the propodeum, a small patch on the pleuron and the posterior lobe of the pronotum, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure smooth except for a medial groove and radiating short ridges medially, otherwise smooth; mesosternal tubercles small but distinct; legs ferruginous except for small spots of white on the fore and mid femora; wings subhyaline except for a lightly clouded anterior margin; second submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen black except a divided band on tergum 1, emarginate bands on terga 2, 3, 4, and 5, and lateral small patches on sterna 3 and 4, all of which are creamy white; pygidium with sides converging apically to a moderately acute apex.

MALE.—Length 13 mm. Body black with creamy white markings, legs largely ferruginous; punctation average; pubescence average.

Head subequal in width to thorax, black except for a large lateral eye patch, the clypeus and an elongate patch between the antennal scrobes, all of which are creamy white; clypeal border with three subequal black denticles; mandibles without denticles, ferruginous with darker apices; antennae black.

Thorax black except the pronotum, a small patch on the posterior lobe of the pronotum, band on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum, a triangular patch on the pleuron and a small patch on the tegulae, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure smooth except for a medial groove and

evanescent grooves basad; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs ferruginous except for a small creamy white spot on each of the fore and mid femora and the basal parts of all legs which are dark fuscous to black; wings subhyaline with a clouded area on the anterior part apically.

Abdomen black except for a broad band constricted medially on tergum 1, a broad band deeply emarginate on tergum 2, narrow bands widening laterally on terga 3, 4, and 5, emarginate band on tergum 6, broken band on sternum 2, band on sternum 3 and lateral patches on sternum 4, all of which are creamy white; prominent rows of bristles on sternum 3 and 4, a shorter row of short appressed bristles on sternum 5; pygidium as illustrated (fig. 62f).

5. *Eucerceris baccharidis*, new species

FEMALE.—Length 9 to 10 mm. Black with creamy white markings and some leg parts fuliginous; punctation average; pubescence short.

Head slightly wider than the thorax; black except frontal eye patches, a patch on the medial and each lateral lobe of the clypeus, an elongate patch between the antennal scrobes, an elongate area back of the eye and a spot on the base of the mandible, all of which are creamy white; clypeal border with a broadly based denticle at the junction of the medial lobe and each lateral lobe, more acute denticles at the meson, a 5th smaller denticle above the medial pair, a cluster of five or six bristles above the medial pair and below the medial single denticle; surface of the medial lobe of the clypeus slightly convex; mandibles with a prominent blunt denticle with a smaller and more acute and basad denticle fused with it at its base; antennae black and normal in form.

Thorax black except for a solid band on the pronotum, two patches on the scutellum, a solid band on the metanotum, an oval patch on the propodeum, a patch on the pleuron below the wing, four small spots on the sternum mesad of the second and third coxae and a small spot on the tegulae, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a medial groove and ridged laterally with the ridges subparallel to the metanotum but bending posterolaterally; mesosternal tubercles appearing as indistinct elevations; legs black to the apical ends of the first two femori and the third coxae, with prominent oval creamy white patches near the apical ends of the first two pair of femori, the remaining more apical segments of all legs are fuliginous; wings subhyaline with the anterior margins dark, second submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen black except for a divided band on tergum 1, narrow solid bands on the apical half of terga 2, 3, 4, and 5, all of which are creamy white; venter immaculate; pygidium with a broad base, sides slightly convex and converging to a slender but rounded apex.

MALE.—Length 9 to 10 mm. Black with creamy white markings except for some leg parts which are fuliginous; punctuation average; pubescence short.

Head subequal in width to the thorax; black except for elongate frontal eye patches which are medially emarginate, most of the medial clypeal lobe, large triangular patches on the lateral lobes, an elongate area between the antennal scrobes, a round spot back of the eye and a patch on the base of the mandible, all of which are

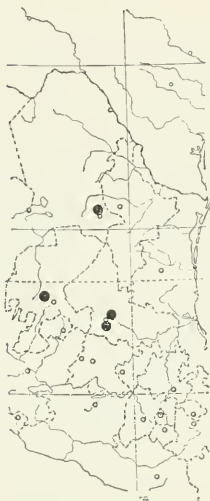


Figure 5. Central Mexico. *E. baccharidis*, new species

creamy white; clypeal border with three black denticles on the medial lobe, the medial one the largest; hair lobes indistinct; mandibles without denticles; antennae black and normal in form.

Thorax colored as for the female; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure as in the female; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs colored as in the female; wing colors and venation as for the female.

Abdomen colored dorsally as on the female; venter with solid creamy white bands on sterna 3 and 4, sternum 5 with minute spots laterally; pygidium as illustrated (fig. 63f).

Both sexes of this species closely resemble *E. vittatifrons* Cresson in size, colors, color pattern and wing venation. The females, however, differ in the structure of the clypeal borders and the oval white patches on the first and second pair of femora of *E. baccharidis*. The males may usually be separated by the oval patches on the fore and mid femora of the latter species.

7. *Eucerceris barri*, new species

FEMALE.—Length 10 mm. Black with creamy white markings; punctuation somewhat less crowded than average; pubescence sparse and very short.

Head slightly wider than the thorax, black except for irregular frontal eye patches, a medial spot above the antennal scrobes and a slightly elongate spot back of the eye, all of which are creamy white; clypeal border with low single denticles on the medial lobe near the fusion with the lateral lobes, a low carina² connects these

two lateral denticles, below this ridge there is a medial cluster of bristles, below these bristles there is a broad extension of the clypeal border the lateral angles of which appear as distinct denticles, surface of the clypeal medial lobe slightly convex; mandibles with a single bicuspidate (cusps appear as one in some specimens) denticle which is low and with a broad base; antennae immaculate, normal in form.

Thorax black except for a divided band on the pronotum, a band on the scutellum, a band on the metanotum, oval spots on the enclosure, patches on the propodeum, small spots on the tegulae and small spots on the pleuron, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a deep medial groove, lightly ridged at about 45° with its base and with a pair of oval spots variable in size; mesosternal tubercle absent; legs black except for traces of

creamy white on the tarsal segments; wings subhyaline with the anterior part clouded, second submarginal cell not petiolate.

Abdomen black except for a divided band on tergum 1, emarginate bands on terga 2, 3, 4, and 5; venter immaculate; pygidium with sides very slightly convex and converging to a rounded apical tip.

MALE.—Length 9 mm. Black with creamy white markings; punctuation somewhat less crowded than average; pubescence sparse and very short.

Head slightly wider than the thorax, black except for the face and an elongate patch on the gena bordering the eye, both of which are creamy white; narrow black stripes extend from the antennal scrobes to connect by an evanescent line with the black of the vertex; base of mandibles, patch on the scape and basal segments of the flagellum creamy white; clypeal border with three blunt denticles on the medial lobe, the medial denticle the smallest; mandibles without denticles but with a slightly elevated carina; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except for a solid band on the prothorax, the posterior lobe of the pronotum, two spots laterally on the scutum, a band on the scutellum, the metanotum, two oval spots on the enclosure, large patches on the propodeum, a large area on the pleuron, most of the sternum, the tegulae, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth, enclosure smooth except for a medial groove and light rugae in the lateral angles; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs largely creamy white except for elongate black areas on the dorsal surfaces of all segments except the tarsi; all tarsi become more or less ferruginous apically; wings subhyaline but lightly clouded along the anterior area, second submarginal cell not petiolate (fig. 65e).

Abdomen black except for broad bands on terga 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, those on 3, 4, and 5 confined medially to the apical part of the tergum, bands on sterna 2, 3, and 4, and evanescent lateral spots on sternum 5, all of which are creamy white; prominent rows of bristles on the apical margins of sterna 3 and 4, an almost indistinguishable pair of bristle clusters on sternum 5; pygidium average in form.

In some females the band on the metanotum is broken into two lateral patches. Some specimens of each sex have the markings somewhat yellow. In some females the 2nd submarginal cell is fully petiolate. On the males the light markings above the antennae may or may not be fused. This species is very close to *E. similis* Cresson

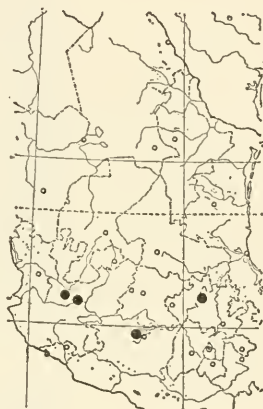

TYPE.—The Neotype male from Kansas is in the collection of the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences. The homotype of *Cerceris bidentata* Say has been lost.

The male of *E. canaliculata* (Say) is at present indistinguishable from the male of *E. sonorae* Scullen except by their distribution or association with the females.

The subspecies *atronitida* Scullen is a darker form found in some areas. An uncommon very light form possibly should be considered as a subspecies. It is found in the lower desert areas such as Imperial County, Calif.

DISTRIBUTION.—The known distribution of the nominate subspecies has been greatly expanded since the writer's 1939 paper (p. 47). Several collecting trips into Mexico by the writer and others in recent years have shown it to range over much of northern Mexico

and as far south as San Luis Potosí and San Blas, Nay. It is recorded as far north as Montana and west to the California coast. A record from Berkeley, Calif. may be open to question. In altitude it ranges from 1,500 to 6,500 ft.

PREY RECORDS.—It seems strange that as common as this species is there is no known case where it has been found nesting and the beetles used by it for prey are still unknown.

E. canaliculata atronitida Scullen was described as a new variety by the writer in 1939. It is now being considered a subspecies. This darker form appears usually at higher altitudes in different areas. There may be some question about the advisability of considering it a subspecies.

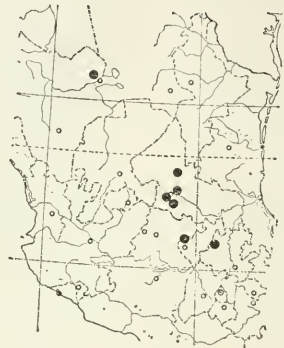


Figure 12. Central Mexico. *E. canaliculata atronitida* Scullen

FEMALE.—Length 12 mm. Head ferruginous with limited black marks, abdomen black and yellow; punctation small and sparse; surface shiny; pubescence very short and inconspicuous.

Head slightly wider than the thorax; ferruginous except small patches bordering the eyes near the vertex, the interocellar area, antennal scrobes, apices of the mandibles, mandibular denticles, clypeal denticles and the apical part of the antennae, all of which are dark fuscous to black; clypeal border with a broad extension on the medial lobe slightly emarginate, a pair of denticles at the junction of the lobes of the clypeus, the lateral one low and rounded, a row of scattered bristles above the medial extension on the medial lobe of the clypeus; mandibles with a single bicuspidate denticle; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except the pronotum, most of the scutellum, the metanotum, two oval patches on the enclosure, large oval patches on the propodeum, an irregular area on the pleuron and a spot on the tegulae, all of which are yellow; the pronotum has a slight elevation on the dorso-lateral area; enclosure with a medial groove, ridged at 45° to the meson; mesosternal tubercles small; legs all ferruginous; wings subhyaline with the anterior part clouded with fulvous.

Abdomen black except for broad bands on terga 1 to 5, sterna 3 and 4, and large lateral patches on sternum 2, all of which are yellow; pygidium with sides converging to a narrow rounded apex.

MALE.—Length 12 mm. Black with yellow and ferruginous markings; punctation average; pubescence very short and inconspicuous.

Head subequal in width to the thorax; black except for most of the face, irregular spots back of the eyes, base of mandibles and small patch on the scape, all of which are yellow, and the genal area which is ferruginous; small black areas appear above the antennal scrobes; three low denticles on the medial clypeal margin, close above and between the denticles are two clusters of short bristles; mandibles without denticles; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except the pronotum, inverted C-shaped patches on the mesoscutum, two large fused patches on the pleuron, a wide band on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum and the tegulae, all of which are yellow; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a medial groove and ridged at about 45° to the meson; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs ferruginous except for limited elongate patches of yellow on the first and second pair of tibiae and femora; wings subhyaline but clouded along the anterior half with a darker area apically.

Abdomen black except for broad bands on terga 1 to 6, sternum 3, and variable lateral patches on sterna 2, 4, and 5; prominent rows of bristles on sterna 3 and 4, a small cluster of short bristles on sternum 5; pygidium as illustrated (fig. 69f).

Yellow oval patches on the enclosure are quite variable in size and may disappear from some specimens. The yellow patches on the propodeum also vary and may be divided into anterior and posterior parts. The yellow marks back of the eyes may be reduced or completely disappear.

TYPE.—The holotype of *E. ferruginosa* Scullen is in the California Academy of Sciences. It was taken at Angeles Bay, Gulf of California, June 26, 1921 (E. P. Van Duzee).

DISTRIBUTION.—Since the description of this species from three specimens in 1939 (p. 45) a limited number of additional specimens have come to the writer's attention. All of these are from the southwestern desert areas, mostly from California and Baja California, Mexico, except for the two specimens recorded from near Winnemucca, Nev.

of the town of Mojave, Kern County, Calif. At the same time and place he took a series of five males of an undescribed species. These are being described in this paper under the name of *E. mojavensis*. Further collections and field observations may show this species to be the male of *E. ferruginosa* Scullen.

DISTRIBUTION.—Numerous records since 1939 have extended the known range of this species further N. into parts of Canada and S. into Mexico. A male recorded from "Sierra Madre Mts., 9,700 feet" is probably from Mexico. This would be the most southern known record and the only one from Mexico. The collector and date are not given on the label.

Many additional collections are recorded within the previously known range. This species is known mostly from elevations above 2,000 feet. Specimens from the northern Rocky Mountains are inclined to have the light markings more creamy white than those farther west.

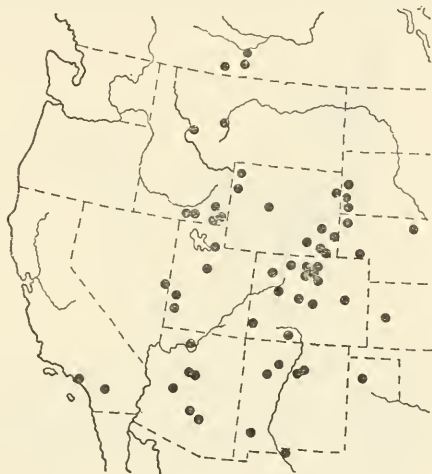


Figure 17. Western U.S. *E. fulvipes* Cresson

Many specimens of this species have been recorded by the writer since its description in 1939. MALE.—The male of this subspecies agrees with the male of the nominate subspecies in all respects except for the following color markings.

Head is the same except *E. lacunosa sabinasae* has no yellow back of the eye.

Thorax of *sabinasae* has only a trace of yellow on the posterior margin of the pronotum and the metanotum.

Abdomen of *sabinasae* has the yellow bands of the terga deeply emarginate with ferruginous on all but tergum 6 and the venter is immaculate.

FEMALE.—The female of this subspecies agrees with the female

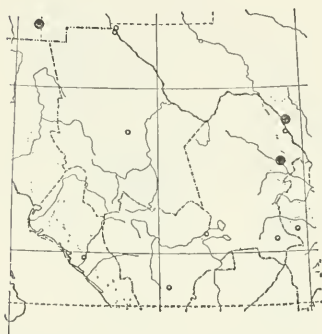


Figure 20. Northern Mexico. *E. lacunosa sabinasae*, new subspecies

of the nominate subspecies in all respects except for the following color markings.

The head of *sabinasae* is ferruginous except for a narrow yellow line bordering the eye on the face.

The thorax is ferruginous except for a trace of yellow on the metanotum, and black along most of the sutures.

The abdomen has yellow bands reduced to posterior ridges of terga 2, 3, and 4; tergum 5 has traces of yellow; the venter is immaculate.

TYPES.—The ♂ type of *Eucerceris lacunosa sabinasae* Scullen is from 23 mi. N. of Sabinas, Coah., Mexico, Aug. 10, 1959 (A. S. Menke and L. A. Stange). FEMALE.—Length 15 mm. Ferruginous with yellow markings and some depressed areas darker; punctation small and mostly crowded; pubescence very short.

Head slightly wider than the thorax, ferruginous becoming more fulvous over the lower face, a narrow wedge of fuscous borders the eye near the vertex, a depressed fuscous area extends through the antennal scrobes and along the sutures of the lower face; clypeal border with two pronounced concavities on the medial lobe, laterad

of each cavity there is a low denticle with a broad base, at the meson between the two depressions there is a cluster of bristles, below these bristles there is a pair of denticles connected with each other by a carina, another similar carina connects the medial denticles with each lateral denticle; mandibles with a single acute denticle; antennae normal in form, basal segments ferruginous, apical segments darker.

Thorax dark ferruginous except for the posterior border of the pronotum, its posterior lobe, the metanotum and an area on the propodeum, all of which are more yellow; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a deep medial groove and ridged subparallel to the base; mesosternal tubercles small; legs ferruginous; wings subhyaline but clouded in the anterior area, second submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen ferruginous except for a broad emarginate band on tergum 1, wide but deeply and broadly emarginate bands on terga 2, 3, and 4, a broad band with an elongate narrow patch of ferruginous on tergum 5, and irregular patches on sterna 2 and 3, all of which are yellow infused with ferruginous; pygidium with sides slightly convex tapering to a small rounded apex.

MALE.—Unknown.

TYPE.—The ♀ type is from La Paz, Baja California, Mexico, Oct. 12, 1954 (F. X. Williams). Deposited at the California Academy of Sciences.

MALE.—The male was described in 1948 from a single specimen. A limited number of specimens has been taken since then.

FEMALE.—The female of *E. melanosa* Scullen has never been recognized. *E. menkei* Scullen, being described in this paper, has color markings similar to *E. melanosa* Scullen and may prove to be the female of that species.

TYPE.—The holotype male of *E. melanosa* Scullen is at the University of Minnesota. It was taken at Tehuacan, Pueb., Mexico, July 12, 1935 (A. E. Pritchard).

DISTRIBUTION.—This species was described (Scullen, 1948, p. 163) from the unique male. Since that time eight additional males have been recorded as listed below. The female has not yet been recognized. Specimens are as follows:

This species was described by the writer in 1948 (p. 164) from seven male specimens. Since that time 41 additional males have been determined. In addition to the above males two females have recently been recognized. The female is described below:

FEMALE.—Length 15 mm. Black and ferruginous with light yellow markings; punctation and pubescence average.

Head subequal in width to the thorax; black and ferruginous except large frontal eye patches, large patches on the lateral and medial clypeal lobes, large patches on the genae, small evanescent

spots on the vertex and lateral spots on the base of the mandibles, all of which are light yellow; the following parts are ferruginous: lower part of the medial lobe of the clypeus, most of the genae exclusive of the yellow patch, the basal half of the mandibles, and the basal third of the antennae; the black vittae of the face extend through the antennal scrobes to the ventral border of the clypeus; mandibles with one medial denticle; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black and ferruginous except a band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, a broad band deeply emarginate on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum, a patch on the pleuron, four small patches on the sternum and large spots on the tegulae all of which are light yellow; ferruginous areas include most of the pleura, most of the sternum, the surrounding border of the yellow patches on the propodeum and most of the tegulae; tegulae normal in form; enclosure with a medial groove and

light ridges extending laterally from the medial groove; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs ferruginous; wings subhyaline except for a darker area apically along the anterior border, second submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen black with limited ferruginous except for broad bands more or less emarginate on terga 1 to 5 and sterna 3 and 4, and small lateral spots on sternum 2, all of which are light yellow; ferruginous largely replaces the black on the 1st tergum, the 1st and 2nd sterna and the entire 6th segment; pygidium with sides slightly convex converging to a rounded apex.

Two specimens of females of *E. melanovittata* Scullen have been recognized. The above description is based largely on one taken at Willcox,

Cochise County, Ariz., July 7, 1956 (A. D. Telford). Another specimen was taken at Davis Mts., Jeff Davis County, Tex., Sept. 4, 1949 (F. Werner and W. Nutting). The latter specimen has markings much lighter than the former and the ferruginous area is very limited on the body parts. Males taken from each of the above localities show similar color variations. Most of the males examined show no ferruginous. Future collections may show it desirable to recognize two subspecies based on the extent of the ferruginous markings.

Two males taken 40 mi. W. of Linares, N. L. Mexico, have the legs very dark and the body parts also darker than the typical form. Further collections may show it desirable to recognize this color form as a distinct subspecies also.

TYPE.—The holotype male of *E. melanovittata* Scullen is at the California Academy of Sciences. It was taken 25 mi. E. of El Paso, Tex., July 13, 1942 (E. C. Van Dyke).

21. *Eucerceris menkei*, new species

FEMALE.—Length 13 mm. Black with yellow markings becoming fulvous on the distal half of the legs; punctation small and crowded; pubescence longer than average on many parts.

Head slightly wider than the thorax; black except for frontal eye patches, patches on the medial clypeal lobe, and each lateral lobe, an elongate area between the antennal scrobes and an elongate patch back of the eye, all of which are dusky yellow; clypeal border with two pair of denticles, each pair located near the junction of the medial and lateral lobes of the clypeus; the two medial pair of denticles connected with each other by an emarginate lamella; medially and just above this lamella there is a small cluster of bristles; mandibles with two denticles, one above the other, the dorsal one much the larger and apically rounded; antennae normal in form, largely fulvous basally but darker apically.

Thorax black except for a line on the pronotum, the metanotum, a patch on the propodeum and a small spot on the pleuron, all of which are yellow; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a deep medial groove and heavily ridged subparallel to the base; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs dark fuscous basally to near the apical end of the femora beyond which they are fulvous; wings subhyaline but clouded with fulvous, darker along the anterior part, second submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen black except for a deeply emarginate band on tergum 1, a narrow posterior band on tergum 2, a broken anterior line on tergum 3, a divided band on terga 4 and 5, tergum 6 exclusive of the pygidium, and broad but emarginate semidivided bands on sterna 3, 4, and 5, all of which are yellow; pygidium with sides slightly convex converging to a narrow rounded apex.

MALE.—Unknown.

E. menkei Scullen is approximately the same size and has about the same color pattern as *E. stangei* Scullen being described from the state of Oaxaca. The clypeal structures of the females are very different. The very unusual position of the mandibular denticles shows a close relationship to *E. sinuata* Scullen. *E. menkei* Scullen is known only from the unique female which is very different from any other known species. The color pattern would indicate it could prove to be the female of *E. melanosa* Scullen.

MALE.—Length 11 mm. Black with creamy yellow and ferruginous markings; punctuation more limited than average; pubescence avery short.

Head subequal in width to the thorax; black except the entire face exclusive of the antennal scrobes, an elongate patch on the gena and basal two thirds of the mandibles, all of which are creamy yellow; ventral parts of the head, much of the gena, basal segments of the antennae, and clypeal border are ferruginous; clypeal border with three subequal denticles; hair lobe bristles not matted, extending somewhat onto the medial lobe; mandibles without denticles; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except a band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe and the episternum, four stripes on the mesoscutum each lateral pair fused anteriorly, a broad band on the scutellum, the metanotum, patches on the tegulae, large patches on the propodeum, a pair of wedge-shaped small patches on the enclosure, most of the mesopleuron, all of which are creamy yellow; tegulae normal in form; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs ferruginous except for patches on all coxae and all trochanters, elongate patches on the fore and mid femora, the fore and mid tarsi, and the apex of the hind femora, all of which are yellow; wings subhyaline with a clouded area along the anterior margin becoming darker apically.

Abdomen with broad bands of creamy yellow on terga 1 to 5; tergum 6 with a medial creamy yellow patch on a background of ferruginous; venter ferruginous with bands on sterna 2 and 3, lateral

patches on sterna 4 and 5, all of which are creamy yellow; broad rows of bristles on sterna 3 and 4, a small divided cluster of short bristles on sternum 5; pygidium as shown (fig. 80c).

The series of males taken at the type location Sept. 30, 1963 was taken at the same time and place as a series of females of *E. ferruginosa* Scullen and may prove to be the unknown male of that species.

TYPE.—The lectotype female of *E. montana* Cresson from Montana (Morrison) is at the Philadelphia Academy of Sciences, no. 1946. The holotype male of *Cerceris sonorensis* Cameron from northern Sonora, Mex., is in the British Museum, no. 21. 1, 435.

DISTRIBUTION.—Although this species was described from one female and two males from "Montana" the writer has never seen any other specimens from that far north. The most northern records are three males from northern Utah and a female from Sterling, Colo. We have found *E. montana* Cr. common to abundant in southern Arizona, southern New Mexico and western Texas. It has been collected by the writer and others south of the border over the central plateau area of Mexico as far south as the states of Jalisco and San Luis Potosí.

PREY RECORDS.—Abundant as this species is nothing is known relative to its nesting habits or the prey used as food for the young.

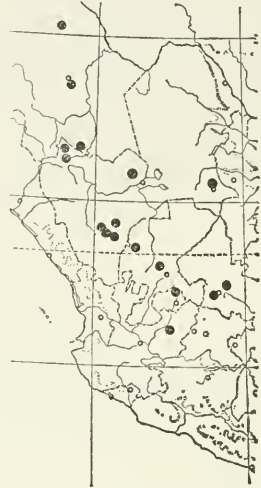


Figure 28. Western Mexico. *E. montana* Cresson

FEMALE.—Length 12 mm. Black and ferruginous with creamy white markings; punctation average; pubescence very short.

Head one seventh wider than the thorax; black except for large frontal eye patches, large patches on the medial and lateral lobes of the clypeus, a constricted patch between the antennal scrobes, an elongate patch back of the eye and a spot on the base of the mandible, all of which are creamy white; limited amounts of ferruginous border the light patches back of the eyes, cover much of the mandibles and the more basal segments of the antennae; clypeal border divided into an upper and a lower portion on the medial lobe, single low denticles are located at the fusion of the medial lobe with each lateral lobe, a pair of denticles is at the meson of the upper portion

of the border between which there is a cluster of bristles, a bilobed extension appears mesad on the lower portion of the border; mandibles with a single large acute denticle with a broad base; antennae dark apically, lighter basally, normal in form.

Thorax black except a band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, a deeply emarginate band on the scutellum, the metanotum, large single patches on the propodeum, a triangular patch on the pleuron and a spot on the tegulae, all of which are creamy white; evanescent areas of light fuscous appear on the pleuron below the light patches and at the meson of the scutellum; tegulae normal in form; enclosure with a deep medial groove and heavy lateral ridges subparallel to the base; mesosternal tubercles present but very small; legs ferruginous; wings subhyaline with a dark area on the anterior border embodying the marginal cell and the apex beyond.

Abdomen black except for broad and emarginate bands on terga 1

to 5 which are creamy white and the basal parts of terga 1 and 2 which are infused with ferruginous and all sterna which are ferruginous; pygidium with sides slightly convex and converging to a rounded apex.

MALE.—Length 11.5 mm. Black with creamy white markings on the body; legs ferruginous with creamy white markings; punctuation average; pubescence very short.

Head one seventh wider than the thorax; black except for the entire face exclusive of black lines through the antennal scrobes (the light area fusing above the antennae), a light spot back of the eye, basal parts of the mandibles and a minute spot on the scape, all of which are creamy white to very light yellow; clypeal border with three dark subequal denticles; mandibles without denticles; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except for a broad band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, an elongate patch on the episternum, an emarginate band on the scutellum, the metanotum, large lateral patches and small more medial spots on the propodeum, a pair of

small spots on the enclosure near the apex, a patch on the pleuron and a spot on the tegulae, all of which are creamy white; tegulae normal; enclosure with a deep medial groove and heavily ridged subparallel to the base; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs ferruginous with light yellow patches of variable sizes on all coxae, all trochanter, the fore and mid femora and the fore and mid tibiae; wings subhyaline with a dark area near the apical end of the stigma and a second dark area near the apex of the fore wing; second submarginal cell not petiolate.

Abdomen black except for a broad band on tergum 1, a broad band enclosing a dark area in the depression on tergum 2, narrow bands broadening laterally on terga 3, 4, and 5, narrow band on tergum 6, spot on sternum 1, bands somewhat emarginate on sterna 2, 3, and 4, and small lateral spots on sternum 5, all of which are creamy white; wide prominent rows of bristles are on the apical margins of sterna 3 and 4; pygidium as illustrated (fig. 29).

FEMALE.—Length 10 mm. Black with creamy white markings; punctuation average; pubescence very short and inconspicuous.

Head about one sixth wider than the thorax; black except large eye patches, large patches on the lateral lobes and the medial lobe of the clypeus, an elongate patch on the frons, an elongate patch back of the eye, all of which are creamy white; clypeal border divided into an upper and a lower portion on the medial lobe, single denticles are located at the fusion of the medial lobe with each lateral lobe, a pair of denticles is at the meson of the upper portion of the border between which there is a group of 2 to 4 long bristles, a bilobed extension appears mesad on the lower portion of the border; the surface of the medial clypeal lobe is only slightly convex; mandibles black with a large acute denticle having a broad base, below and more basad there is a small denticle (visible only when specimen is viewed from a certain angle); antennae black and normal in form.

Thorax black except for a band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, two patches on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum, a patch on the pleuron below the wing, and a spot on the tegula, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a medial groove and lightly ridged

at about 45° ; mesosternal tubercle very small; all coxae, trochanters, and the first femur black except for a creamy white spot on the above femur, other leg parts ferruginous becoming darker on the third tarsi; wings subhyaline clouded at the apex; the second submarginal cell is petiolate.

Abdomen black except for a divided band on tergum 1, emarginate bands on terga 2, 3, 4, and 5; venter immaculate, pygidium with the sides slightly convex converging to a rounded apex.

MALE.—Length 11 mm. Black with creamy white markings; punctuation average; pubescence very short and inconspicuous.

Head very slightly wider than the thorax; black except for very

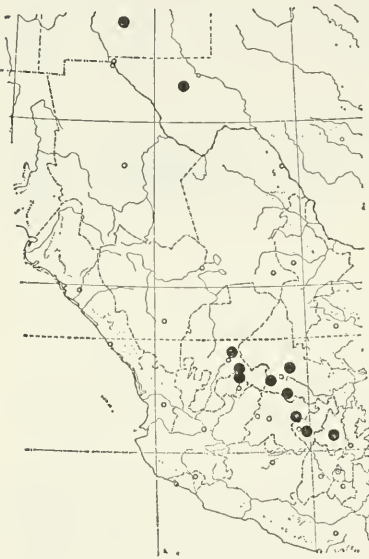


Figure 30. Central Mexico. *E. morula morula*, new species

large eye patches, the entire clypeus, basal two thirds of the mandibles and a small spot back of the eye, all of which are creamy white; the black vitta on the face extend to the clypeal border and fuse with the black of the vertex; clypeal border with three subequal black denticles on the medial lobe; bristle-like setae over the entire lower clypeal area; mandibles without denticles; antennae black and normal in form.

Thorax black except for a band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, a divided band on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum, a patch on the pleuron below the wing and a spot on the tegula, all of which are creamy white; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a medial groove and ridged at a 45° to 60° angle with the mesal groove; mesosternal tubercle absent;

all coxae and trochanters black marked with considerable creamy white, fore femora black with large creamy white patches apically, remaining parts of all legs largely ferruginous with a large creamy white patch on the mid femora and small spots on the fore and mid pair of tibiae; wings subhyaline with dark patches near the apex; the 2nd submarginal cell is not petiolate.

Abdomen black except for a broad semidivided band on tergum 1, emarginate bands on terga 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, bands on sterna 2 and 3, and lateral patches on sternum 4, all of which are creamy white; wide prominent rows of bristles appear inserted on the apical margins of sterna 3 and 4, a very indistinct pair of bristle clusters may appear on sternum 5; the pygidium has the form illustrated (fig. 82f).

Both sexes of *E. morula morula* Scullen closely resemble *E. vittatifrons* Cresson in size and color. The females may be distinguished by the structure of the clypeal borders and the males by the color pattern of the face, the abdominal bristles and the venation of the wings. The male of *E. morula morula* is close to the male of *E. baja* Scullen but is distinguished from that species by the ferruginous area back of the eye and a very distinct row of bristles on sternum 5 on the latter species. The male of *E. pacifica* Scullen is also very close, but the key should separate them. (See notes under *E. morula albarenae* Scullen, p. 48.)

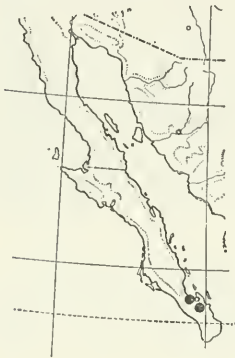


Figure 31. Baja California. *E. pacifica* Scullen

Female.—Length 15 mm. Black with yellow markings; punctation small and crowded; pubescence short.

Head about one ninth wider than the thorax; black except for most of the face, large elongate patches back of the eyes, two large oval spots on the vertex back of the ocelli, most of the mandibles and a small patch on the scape, all of which are yellow; clypeal border with a medial rounded black extension, flanked on each side by a low black denticle on the medial lobe of the clypeus; mandibles with one large blunt denticle; antennae normal in form, ferruginous below and darker above.

Thorax black except for a divided band on the pronotum, a small patch on the posterior lobe, a trace on the mesoscutum, an emarginate band on the scutellum, the entire enclosure, a reversed J-shaped patch on the propodeum, two large angular patches on the mesopleuron and two small spots on the metapleuron, three pairs of patches on the sternum and a small patch on the tegula, all of which

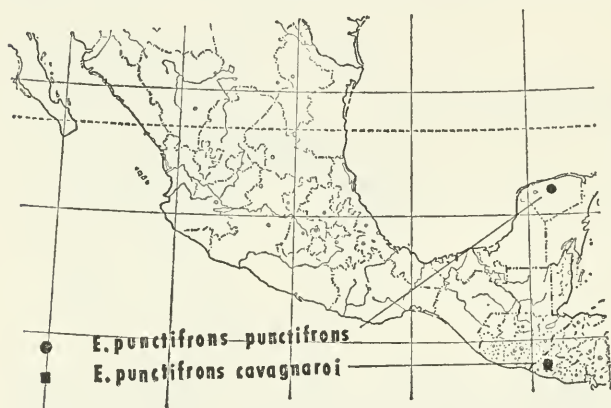


Figure 33. Mexico. *E. punctifrons punctifrons* (Cameron), *E. punctifrons cavagnaroi*, new subspecies

are yellow; tegulae normal in form; the enclosure closely pitted except along the basal margin, and with a light medial groove; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs largely yellow but with dark fuscous areas on all coxae, trochanters, femora and on the mid and hind tibiae; wings light fulvous; 2nd submarginal cell not petiolate.

Abdomen with yellow bands on terga 1 to 5 deeply emarginate and the lateral expansion of the bands of terga 3, 4, and 5 with dark patches; a yellow patch on terga 6 laterad of the pygidium; first four sterna largely yellow; fifth sternum with lateral yellow areas; pygidium with sides convex, apex rounded, and base converging.

This unique female is structurally like the female of *E. punctifrons* Cameron except for the more extended yellow parts. In the nominate subspecies the yellow of the scutellum is separated into two lateral large spots, the enclosure is black except for two elongate yellow spots near the base, and the bands on the terga are much reduced.

MALE.—Unknown.

The female of *E. rubripes* Cresson is very close to the female of *E. apicata* Banks from which it may be separated by the following characteristics: (1) The mesal clypeal area of *rubripes* shows a dis-

tinct dorsal carina with a medial single minute denticle just below the prominent acute tubercle common to both species; (2) The mandibles of *rubripes* are unidentate and the mandibles of *apicata* are bidentate; (3) The pygidium of *rubripes* is definitely rounded apically while in *apicata* it is truncate with the apical margin somewhat emarginate. The distribution of the two species overlap in the central Rocky Mountain area.

At the time the female was described in 1948 the male of *E. ruficeps* Scullen was unknown. The male is described here. By error the holotype and paratypes were indicated as "males."

MALE.—Length 10 mm. Black with light yellow markings; punctuation normal; pubescence short.

Head one fourth wider than the thorax, black except for the entire face and small narrow patches back of the eyes; small black patches appear above the antennal scrobes; three subequal denticles on the margin of the medial clypeal lobe; mandibles without denticles; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black except for the pronotum, a divided band on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum, and most of the pleuron and ventral surfaces, all of which are light yellow;

tegulae low and smooth; enclosure with a light medial groove and heavily ridged subparallel to its base; mesosternal tubercle absent; legs all yellow except for variable patches of fulvous mesad on the femora and the slightly darkened tarsi; wings subhyaline with a clouded area over the anterior half; 2nd submarginal cell not petiolate.

Abdomen with broad yellow bands on terga 1 to 6, sterna 2 and 3, a small patch on sternum 1, an interrupted band on sternum 4, and lateral small patches on sternum 5, all of which are yellow; pygidium usual in form (fig. 87f).

TYPE.—The holotype female from Antioch, Calif., Aug. 7, 1938 (J. W. MacSwain) is at the California Academy of Sciences.

DISTRIBUTION.—A total of 20 females and 35 males is recorded from Antioch, Calif. One male was taken on Bethel Island near Antioch and one female was taken at Del Puerto Canyon in Stanislaus County, Calif. This species was found nesting at Antioch by Linsley and MacSwain (see Linsley and MacSwain, 1954). FEMALE.—Length 13 mm. Ferruginous to fuliginous and fuscous with light yellow markings; punctuation average; pubescence average.

Head slightly wider than the thorax, ferruginous with a narrow darker patch bordering the eyes near the vertex and the apices of the mandibles and mandibular denticles which are dark fuscous (some specimens of females show dark stripes passing through the antennal scrobes fusing with a similar dark area embodying the ocelli); the following parts are yellow: large lateral eye patches, an elongate patch between the antennal scrobes, the entire clypeus except the border denticles and an evanescent patch back of the eyes; clypeal border with four subequal denticles, the medial pair of denticles connected by a concave lamella-like structure, a concave area between the lateral and the medial denticles, and a small cluster of bristles just above the medial pair of denticles; a low cone-shaped elevation appears on the surface of each lateral lobe of the clypeus; a small but distinct cone-shaped elevation with a truncate apex appears on the frons just above the epistomal suture; mandibles

with one prominent acute denticle; antennae normal in form, ferruginous basally, becoming darker apically.

Thorax ferruginous infused with variable amounts of fuscous; yellow markings as follows: band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, evanescent lateral spots on the scutellum, the metanotum, angular patches on the pleuron, small patches on the tegulae, evanescent small spots on the enclosure, and large patches on the propodeum; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure smooth except for a medial groove and short ridges extending laterally from the meson; mesosternal tubercles small and acute but very distinct; legs ferruginous; wings subhyaline with the anterior area clouded; stigma and more basad border golden; second submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen ferruginous except for the depressed areas on terga 2, 3, and 4, and the following parts which are yellow: a broad band on terga 1 and 5, broad bands embodying the dark depressed areas on

terga 2, 3, and 4, the sides of tergum 6, bands on sterna 3 and 4, and evanescent patches on sternum 5; pygidium with slightly convex sides converging to a small rounded apex.

MALE.—Length 13 mm. Ferruginous with limited areas darker and with light yellow markings; punctation average.

Head subequal in width to the thorax, ferruginous with a narrow darker patch bordering the eye near the vertex and the apices of the mandibles which are dark fuscous; face ferruginous except for broad lines through the antennal scrobes, an evanescent patch back of the eye, patch on base of mandible and spot on the scape, all of which are yellow; clypeal border with three denticles, the medial one the largest; mandibles without denticles; antennae normal in form, ferruginous basally with a trace of yellow on the scape and darker apically.

Thorax ferruginous becoming darker along the anterior and posterior margins of the mesoscutum and on the enclosure; light yellow markings as follows: band on prothorax extending onto the posterior lobe, angular patches on the pleuron, small patches on the tegulae, an evanescent band on the scutellum, the metanotum, and large patch on the propodeum; tegulae low and smooth; enclosure smooth except for a medial groove and short ridges extending out from the meson, mesosternal tubercle absent; legs ferruginous except for elongate patches on the fore and mid tibiae, and evanescent small patches on femora, all of which are yellow; wings subhyaline except for the usual clouded area along the anterior margin; 2nd submarginal cell not petiolate.

Abdomen ferruginous with wide yellow bands on terga 1 to 5, and sterna 3, 4, and 5, depressed area on tergum 2 small and ferruginous; depressed areas on terga 3, 4, and 5 fuscous; an evanescent yellow patch on sternum 1 and broken band of yellow on sternum 5, long rows of long loose bristles on sterna 3 and 4, a short row of short fused bristles on sternum 5; pygidium as illustrated (fig. 90g).

E. sonora Scullen is very close to *E. canaliculata* (Say) in structure, size and color pattern. The females of the former species are easily distinguished by the prominent process on the frons just above the epistomal suture and the medial pair of denticles on the clypeal border which are relatively larger than on *E. canaliculata* (Say). The elevations on the lateral lobes of the clypeus of *sonorae* Scullen are relatively short compared to those on most females of *canaliculata* (Say). The males of *sonorae* Scullen and of *canaliculata* (Say) are indistinguishable except by association with the female.

FEMALE.—Length 12 mm. Black with yellow markings; punctation small and crowded; pubescence general, of average length.

Head slightly wider than the thorax; black except for small eye patches, a small patch between the antennal scrobes and small spots back of the eyes, all of which are yellow; clypeal border with two prominent blunt extensions on the medial clypeal lobe between which there is a group of prominent bristles; clypeal surface without distinct elevations; a low cone-shaped elevation on the frons between the antennal scrobes; mandibles with a single prominent denticle curved ventrad, distad of which there is a concavity; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black, immaculate; pronotum with noticeable elevations dorso-laterally; tegulae punctate over most of their surfaces; scutellum, metanotum and the entire propodeum, including the enclosure, closely and finely punctate; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs black except for an evanescent stripe on each tibia and a lighter area at the apical end of the 3rd femur; wings subhyaline but darker along the anterior half, 2nd submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen black except as follows: band on the apical half of tergum 3, two parallel bands on terga 4 and 5, tergum 6 exclusive of the pygidium, and broad bands on sterna 3, 4, and 5, all of which are yellow; pygidium with sides slightly convex and converging apically to a rounded apex, amber slightly infused with black.

MALE.—Length 12 mm. Black with yellow markings; punctation small and crowded; pubescence general, longer than average on many parts.

Head slightly wider than the thorax; black except for the entire face, basal three fourths of mandibles, anterior surface of the scape and a small spot back of the eye, all of which are yellow; clypeal surface depressed medially, border slightly extended on the medial lobe, margin without denticles; a low carina between the antennal

scrobes; mandibles with an upper acute and a lower blunt denticle on the mesal surface, denticles connected by a curved ridge; antennae normal in form.

Thorax black, immaculate; tegulae punctate over their anterior half, otherwise smooth; scutellum, metanotum and the entire propodeum including the enclosure closely and finely punctate; mesosternal tubercles absent; legs black dorsally, yellow ventrally; wings subhyaline but darker along the anterior half; 2nd submarginal cell petiolate.

Abdomen black except for: band on the apical half of tergum 3 (some specimens have an evanescent narrow band on the basal half), two parallel bands on terga 4, 5, 6, and most of 7, all of which are yellow; pygidium slightly longer than broad, yellow infused with black; sterna 3, 4, 5, and 6 with variable amounts of yellow laterally;

ventral abdominal bristles forming distinct medially divided rows on sterna 3, 4, and 5, indistinct row on sternum 6; masses of prominent long setae covering much of sterna 3 and 4.

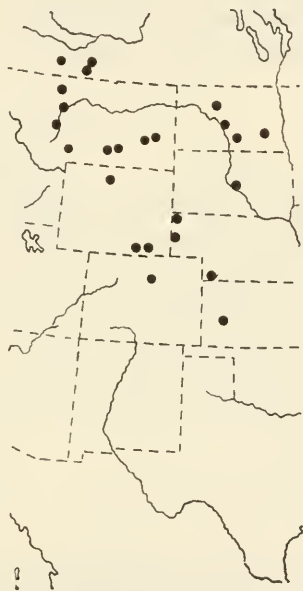


Figure 41. Western U.S. *E. superba superba* Cresson

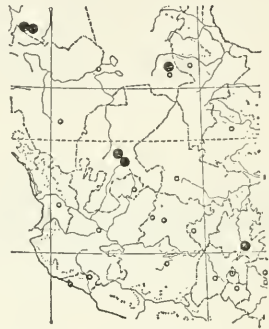


Figure 43. Central Mexico. *E. tricolor* Cockerell

southern record for the genus and it is one of three species in which the 2 submarginal cell of the fore wing is not petiolate. Efforts have been made to locate the "Cabima" recorded as the type location. The late J. Zetek, for many years in charge of the Balboa Laboratory, was most helpful in this connection. Several localities carry the name "Cabima" so that it has been impossible to determine without question which is the true type locality. Several of the localities by that name are now under water. In view of the fact that it is a very large species measuring 23 mm. in length, it is strange no other collector has taken it.

MALE.—Length 14 mm. Black and ferruginous with yellow markings; punctation average; pubescence short.

Head subequal in width to the thorax; background color black except for a large dark ferruginous area on the gena and yellow which covers the face exclusive of the black vitta through the antennal scrobes; clypeal border with three denticles, the medial one the

largest; mandibles without denticles, ferruginous with darker apices; antennae normal in form, basal segments ferruginous, apical segments fuscous.

Thorax black except for the band on the pronotum extending onto the posterior lobe, an angular patch on the pleuron, two small lateral spots on the scutellum, the metanotum, large patches on the propodeum and a patch on the tegula, all of which are yellow, ferruginous areas include most of the scutellum and the borders of most of the yellow markings including the tegulae; tegulae normal in form; enclosure largely smooth but with a medial groove and short adjoining ridges and with a few scattered lateral punctures; mesosternal tubercles lacking; legs ferruginous with a slightly darker area on the hind tibiae, small yellow spots on the fore coxae and limited fuscous on all coxae; wings subhyaline with a darker area along the anterior portion, 2nd submarginal cell not petiolate.

Abdomen with background and depressed areas black to ferruginous with a broad emarginate band on terga 1 and 6, divided bands on terga 2, 3, 4, and 5, a divided small patch on sternum 2, an irregular small band on sternum 3 and a broken band on sternum 4, all of which are yellow; wide bands of long bristles on sterna 3 and 4, a short band of closely appressed short bristles on sternum 5; pygidium as illustrated (fig. 97c).

FEMALE.—Unknown.

The male of *E. zimapanensis* Scullen superficially looks very much like the male of *E. mellea* Scullen but the latter has only a single small divided cluster of bristles on sternum 5.

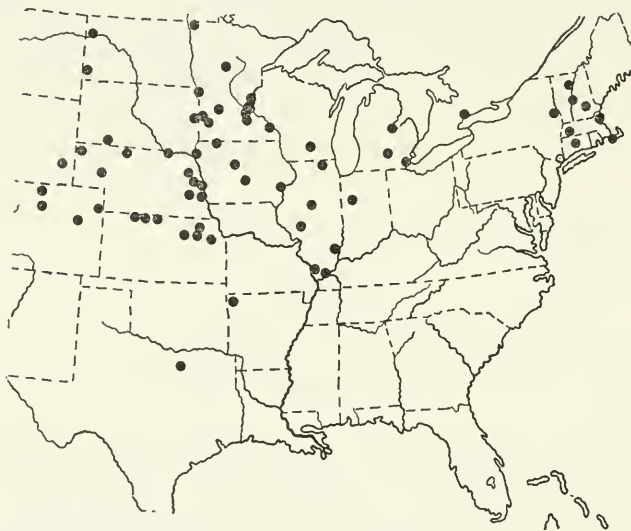


Figure 48. Eastern and Central U.S.

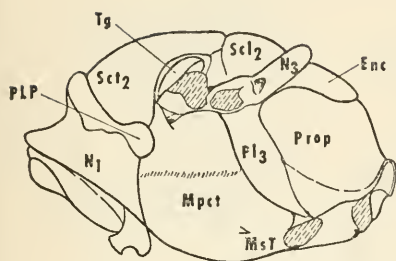

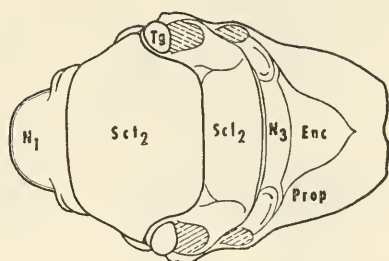

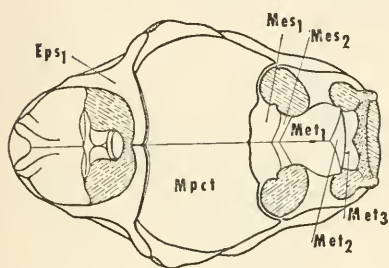

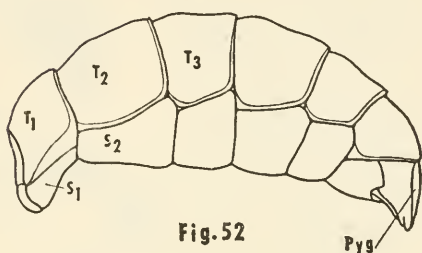

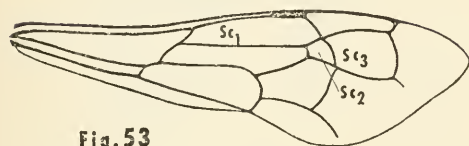

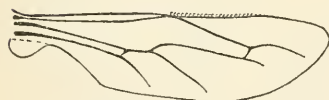

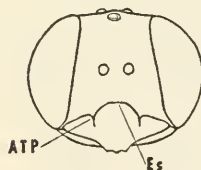

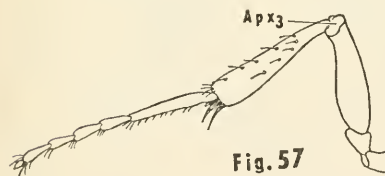

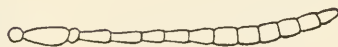
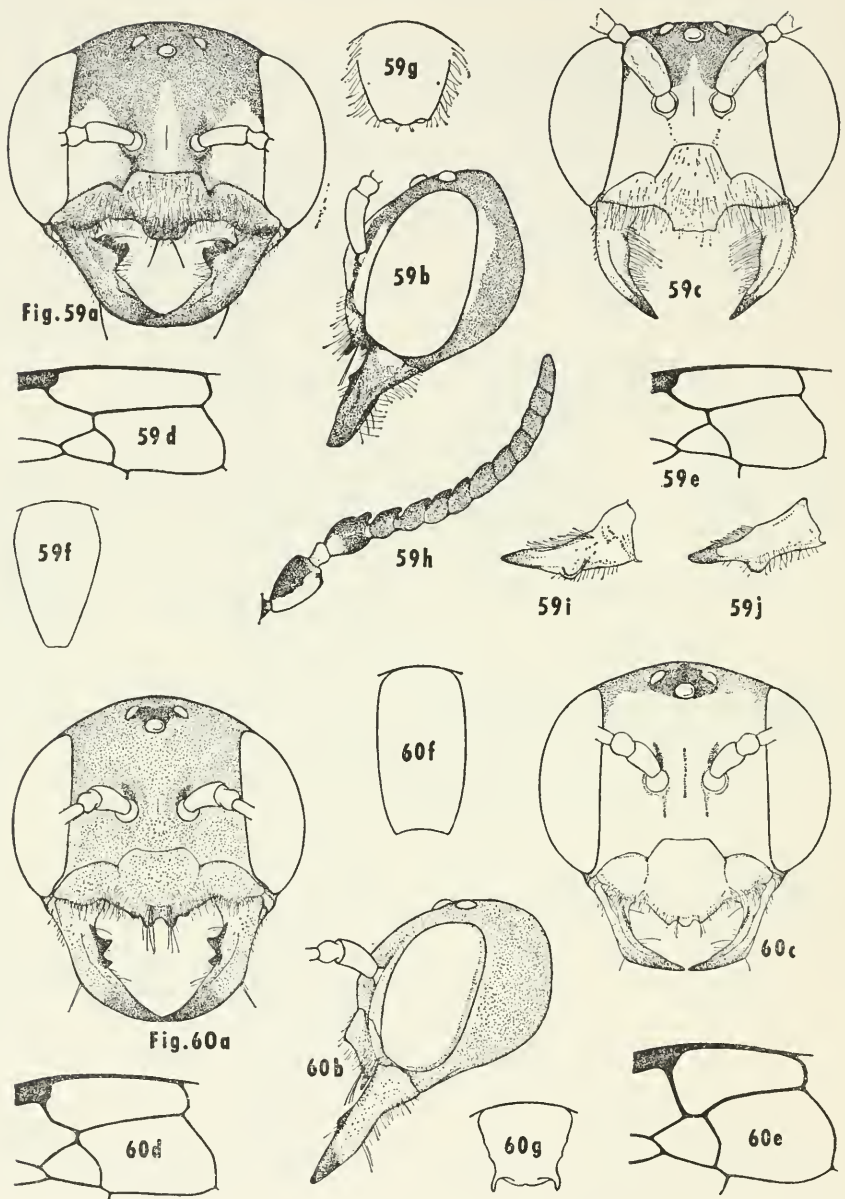
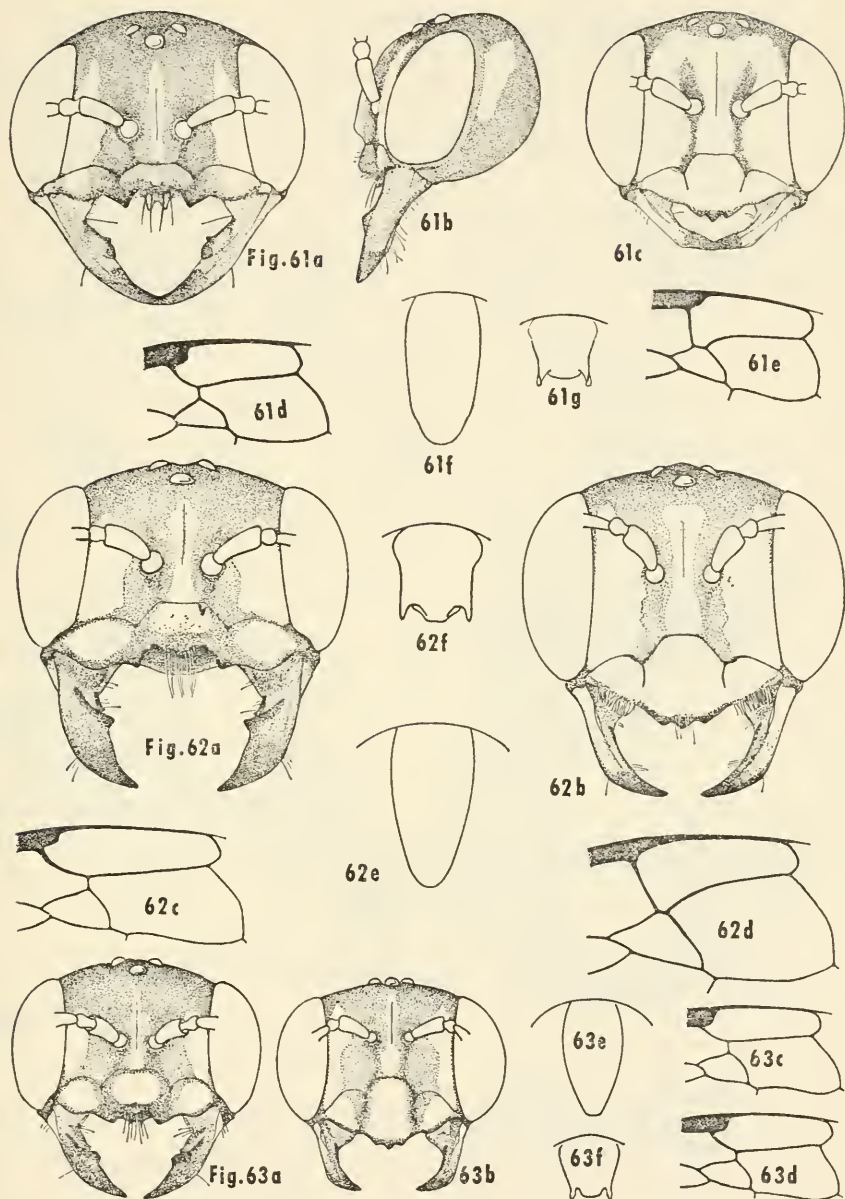

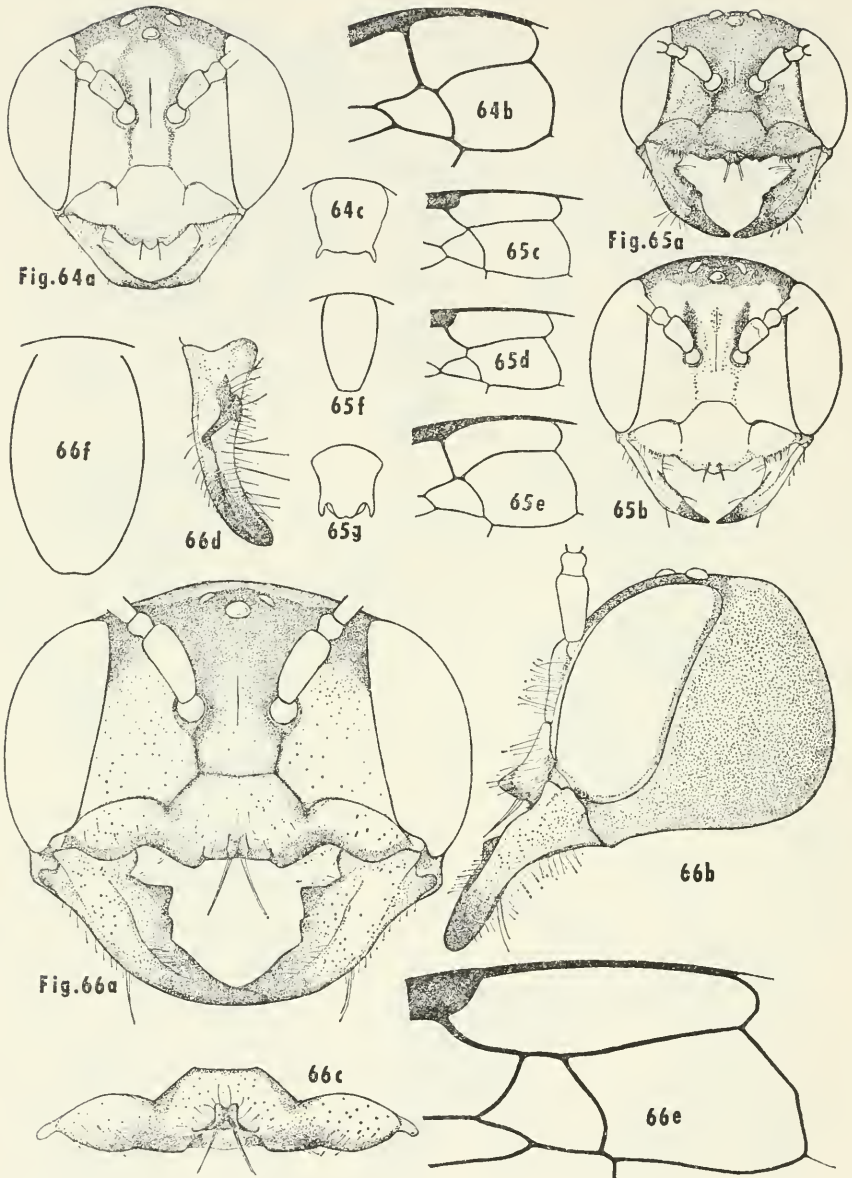
FIGURES 49-58.—49, Lateral aspect of thorax; 50, dorsal aspect of thorax; 51, ventral aspect of thorax; 52, lateral aspect of abdomen of male; 53, forewing; 54, apical cells of forewing with petiolate second submarginal cell; 55, posterior wing; 56, face of male; 57, leg showing reniform distal end of hind femora; 58, normal form of antennae of male.



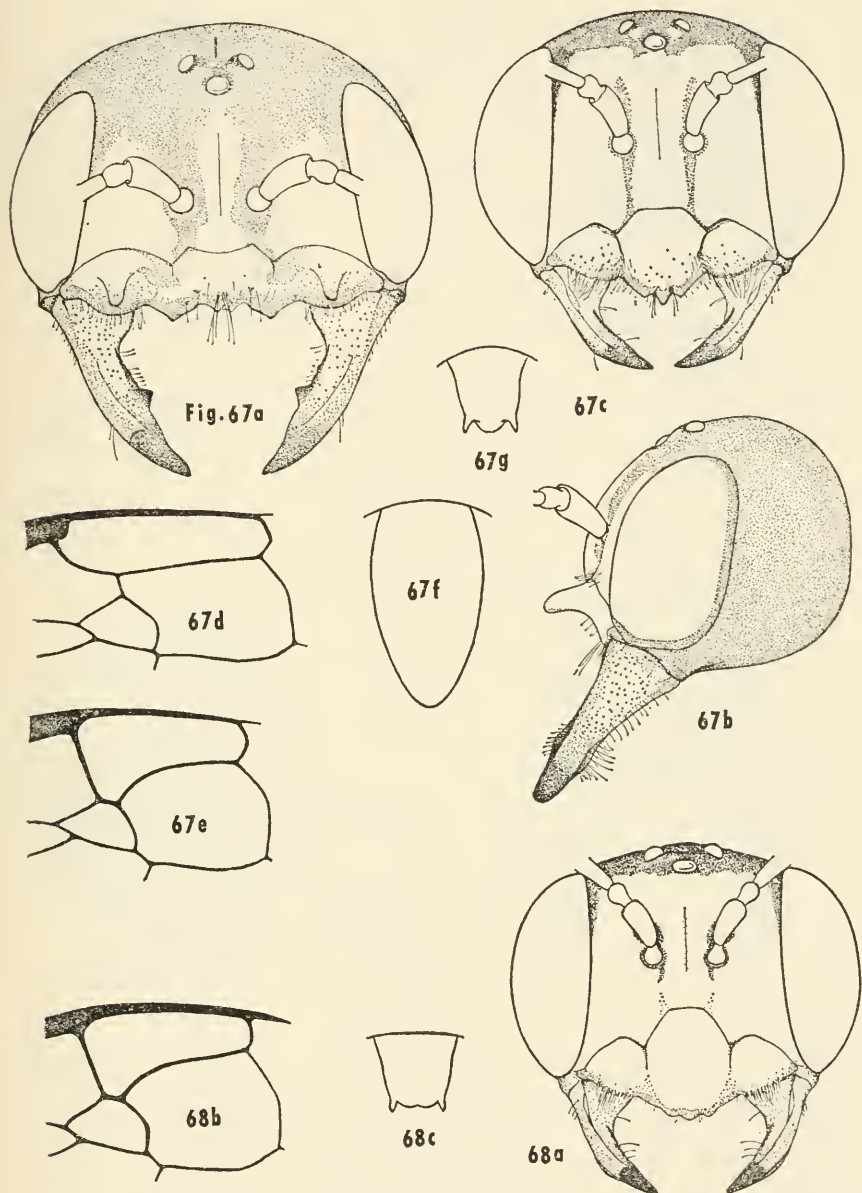
FIGURES 59-60.—59, *E. angulata* Rohwer (a=female face, b=female head profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium, h=male antennae, posterior view, i=male mandible, dorsal, j=male mandible, ventral); 60, *E. apicata* Banks (a=female face, b=female head profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium).



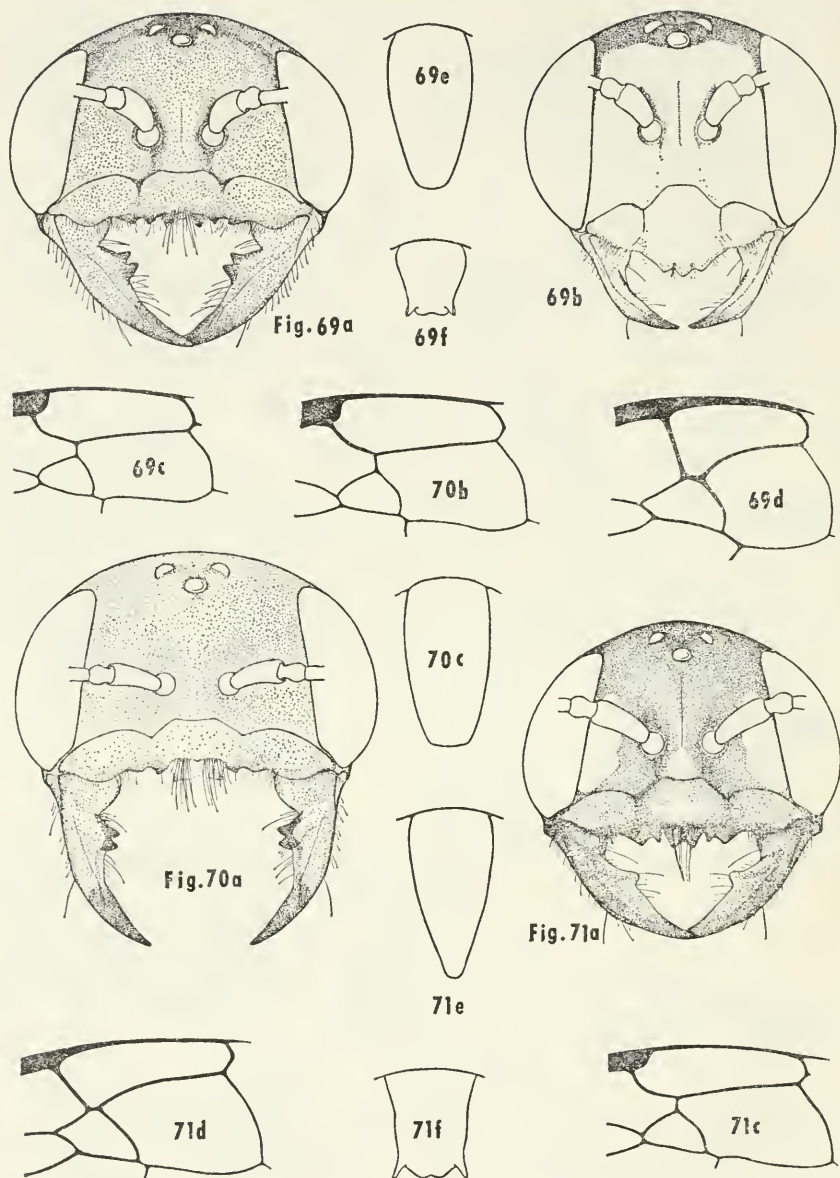
FIGURES 61-63.—61, *E. arenaria* Scullen (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium); 62, *E. atrata* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium); 63, *E. baccharidis* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium).



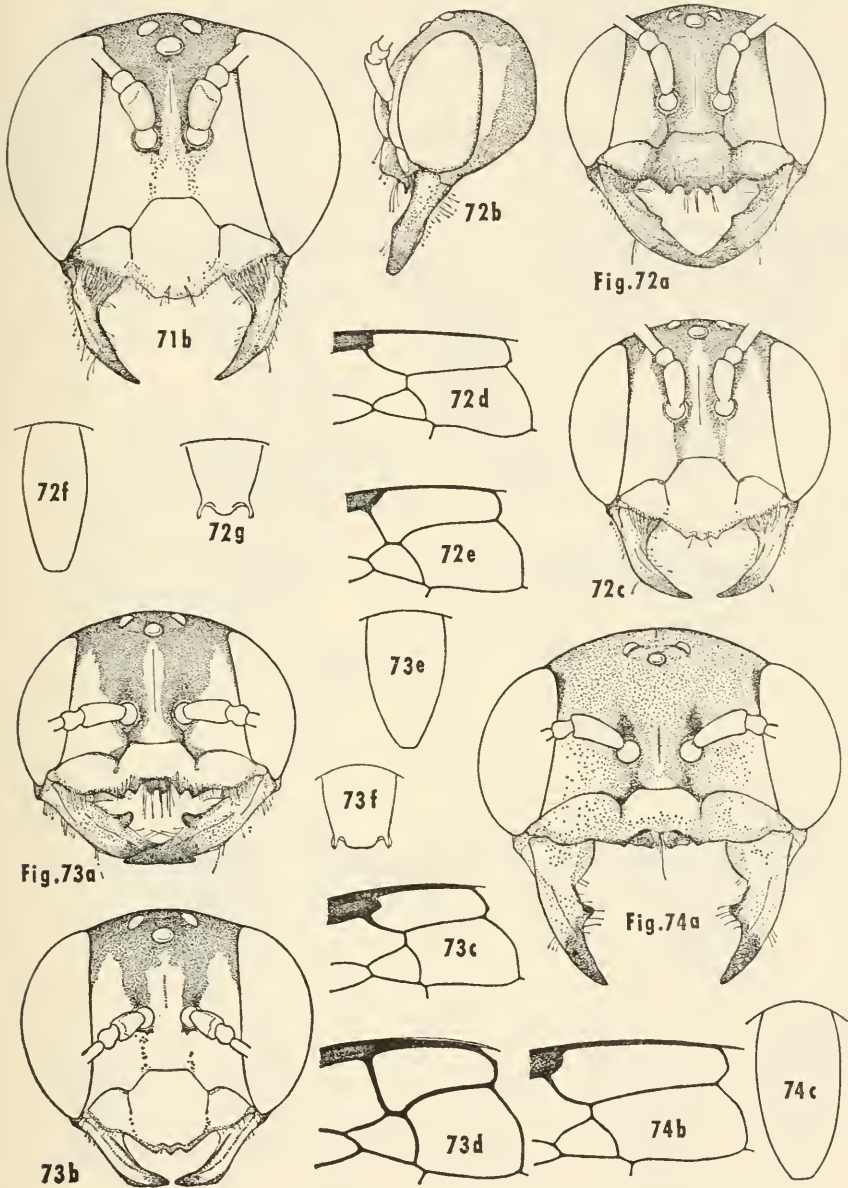
FIGURES 64-66.—64, *E. baja* Scullen (a=male face, b=male wing, c=male pygidium); 65, *E. barri* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing and d=female wing showing variation, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium); 66, *E. brunnea* Scullen (a=female face, b=female profile, c=female clypeus, d=female mandible, mesal view, e=female wing, f=female pygidium).



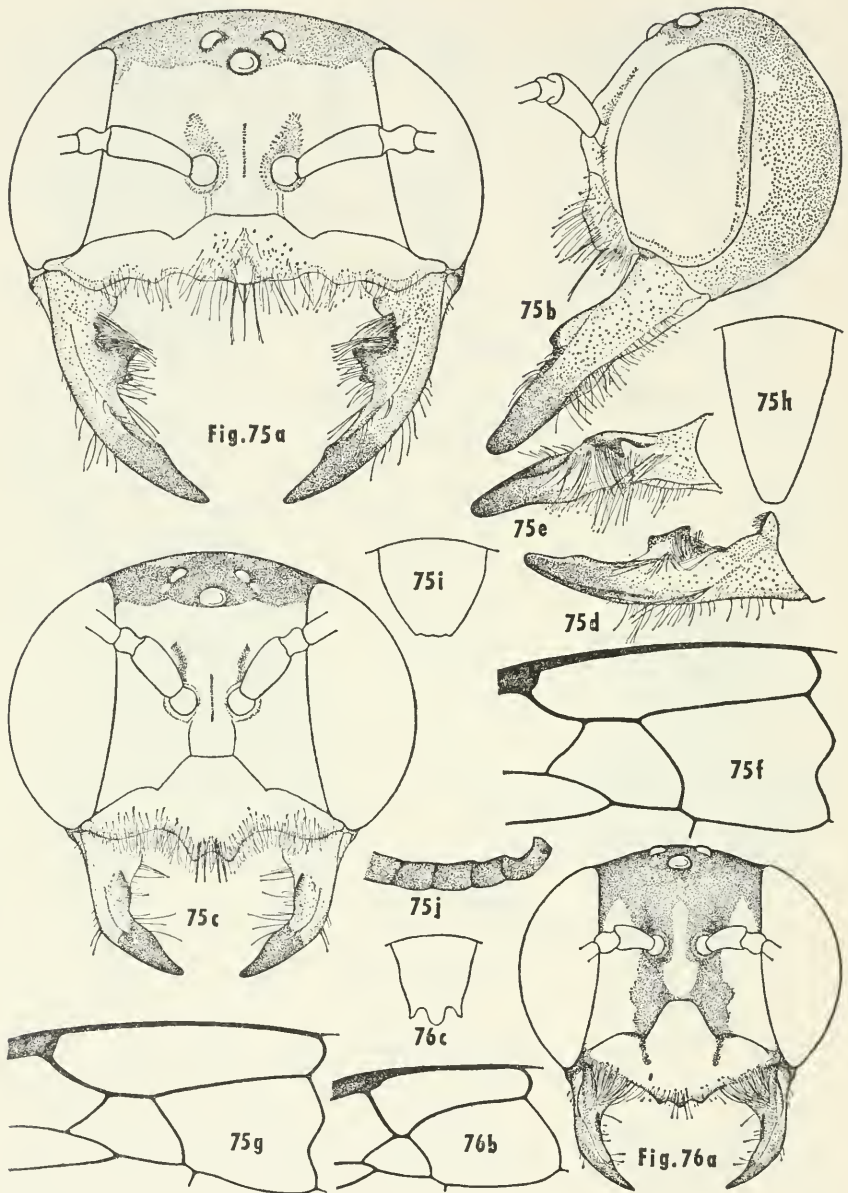
FIGURES 67-68.—67, *E. canaliculata canaliculata* (Say) (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium); 68, *E. elegans elegans* Cresson (a=male face, b=male wing, c=male pygidium).



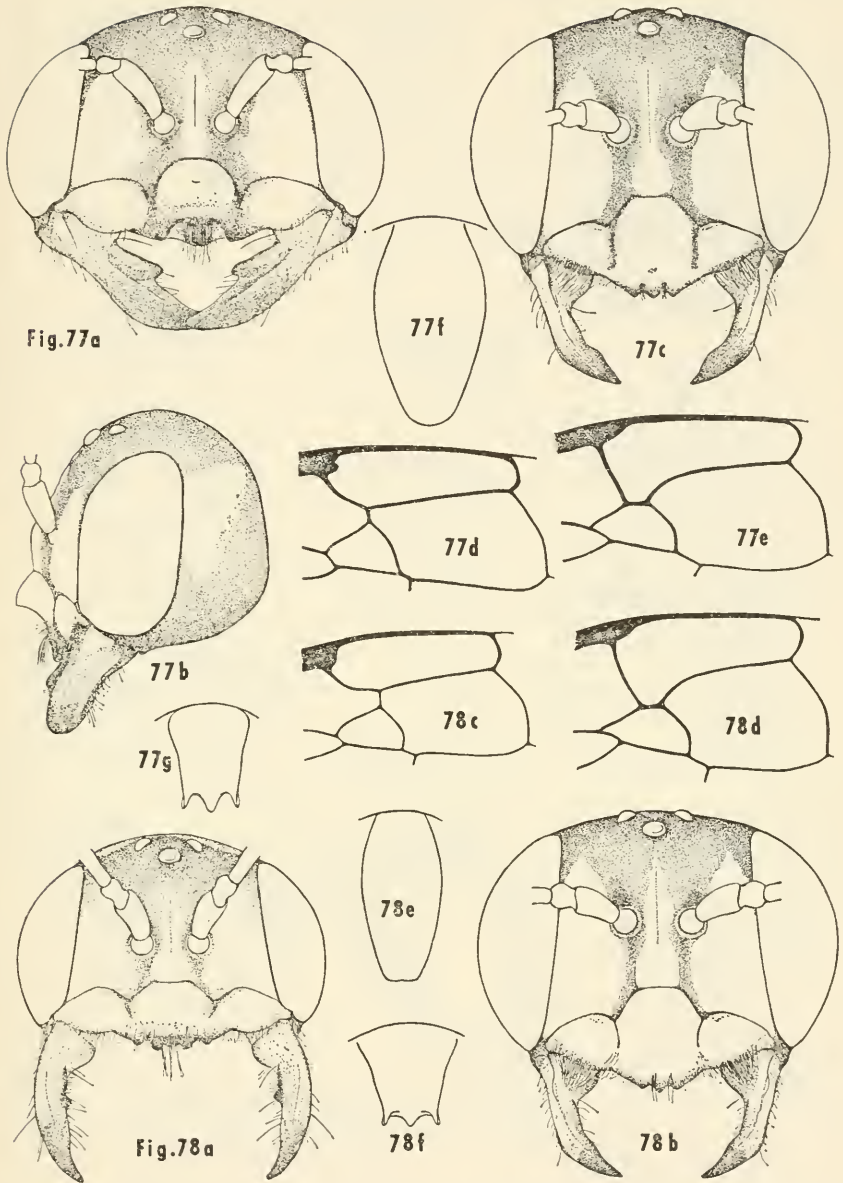
FIGURES 69-71.—69, *E. elegans monoensis* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium); 70, *E. ferruginosa* Scullen (a=female face, b=female wing, c=female pygidium); 71, *E. flavocincta* Cresson (a=female face [b=male face, page 87] c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium).



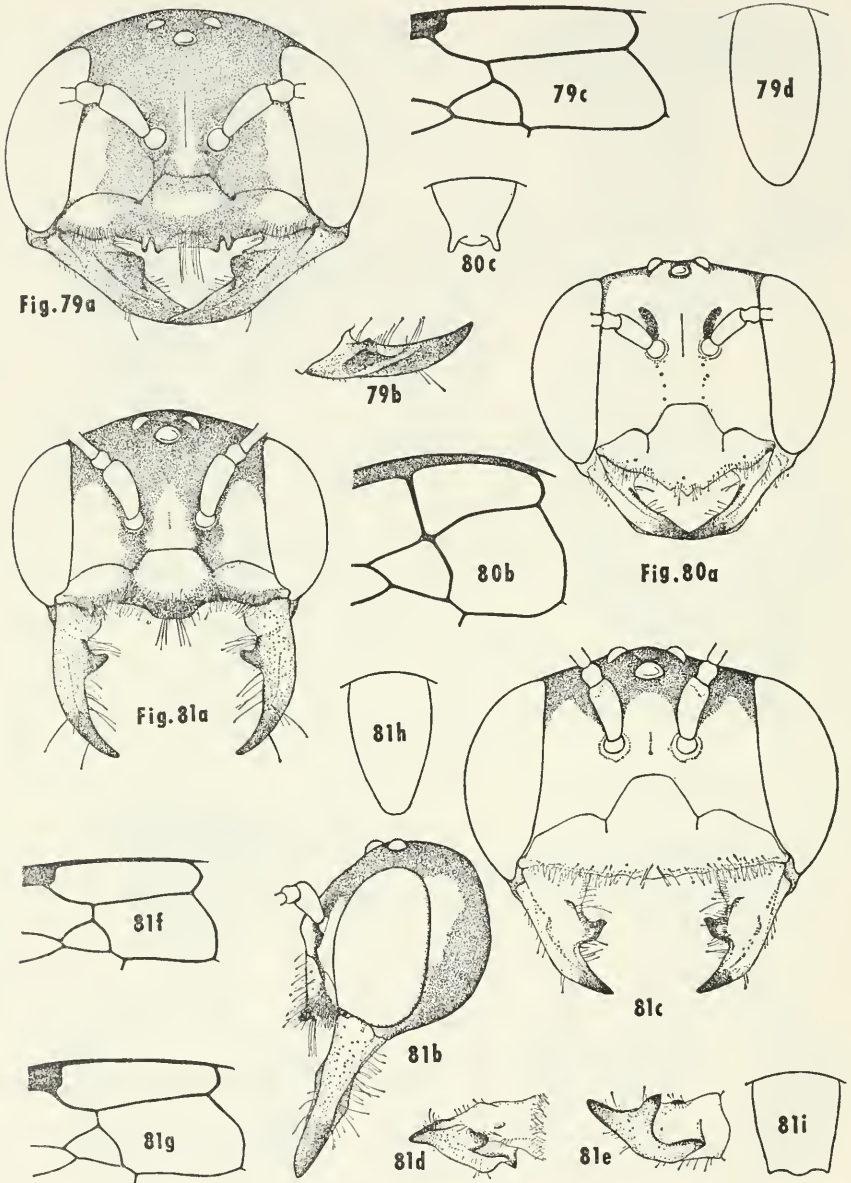
FIGURES 71-74.—71, *E. flavocincta* Cresson (b=male face); 72, *E. fulvipes* Cresson (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium); 73, *E. insignis* Provancher (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium); 74, *E. lapazensis* Scullen (a=female face, b=female wing, c=female pygidium).



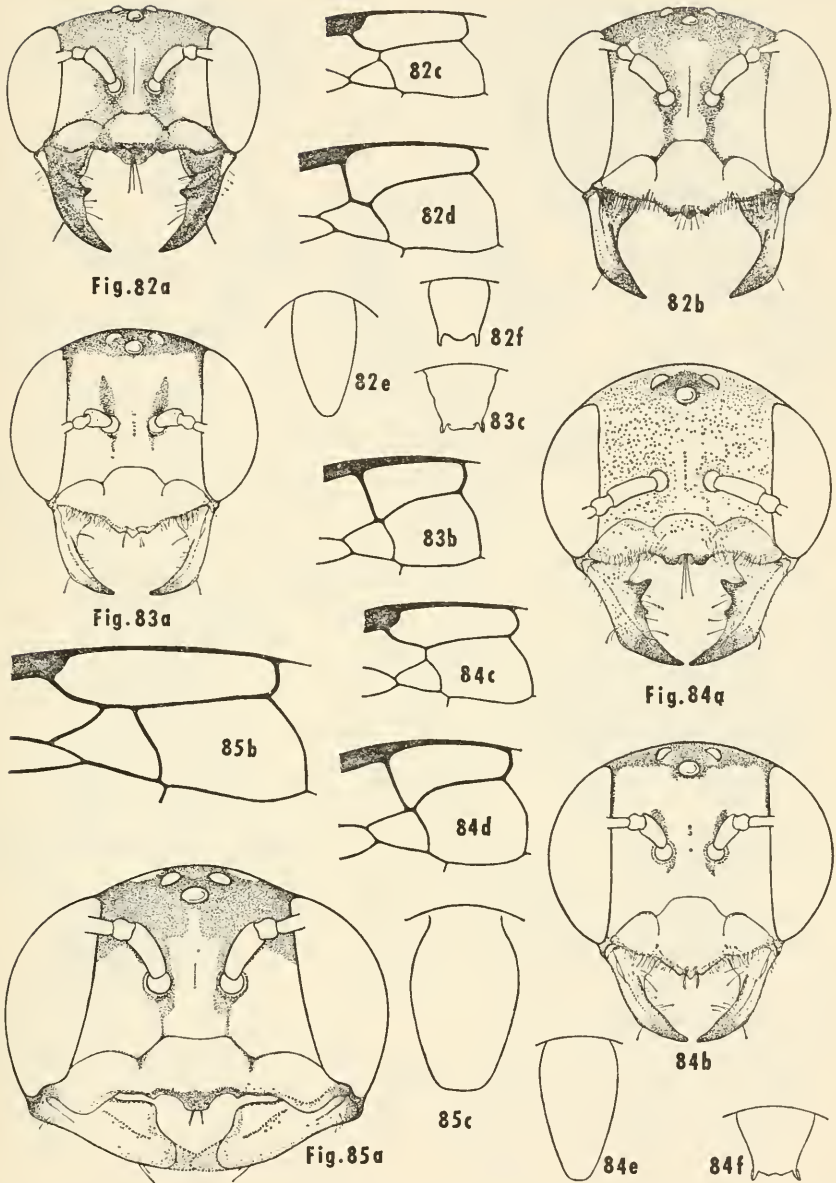
FIGURES 75-76.—75, *E. lacunosa* Scullen (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female mandible, lateral view, e=female mandible, mesal view, f=female wing, g=male wing, h=female pygidium, i=male pygidium, j=male antennae); 76, *E. melanosca* Scullen (a=male face, b=male wing, c=male pygidium).



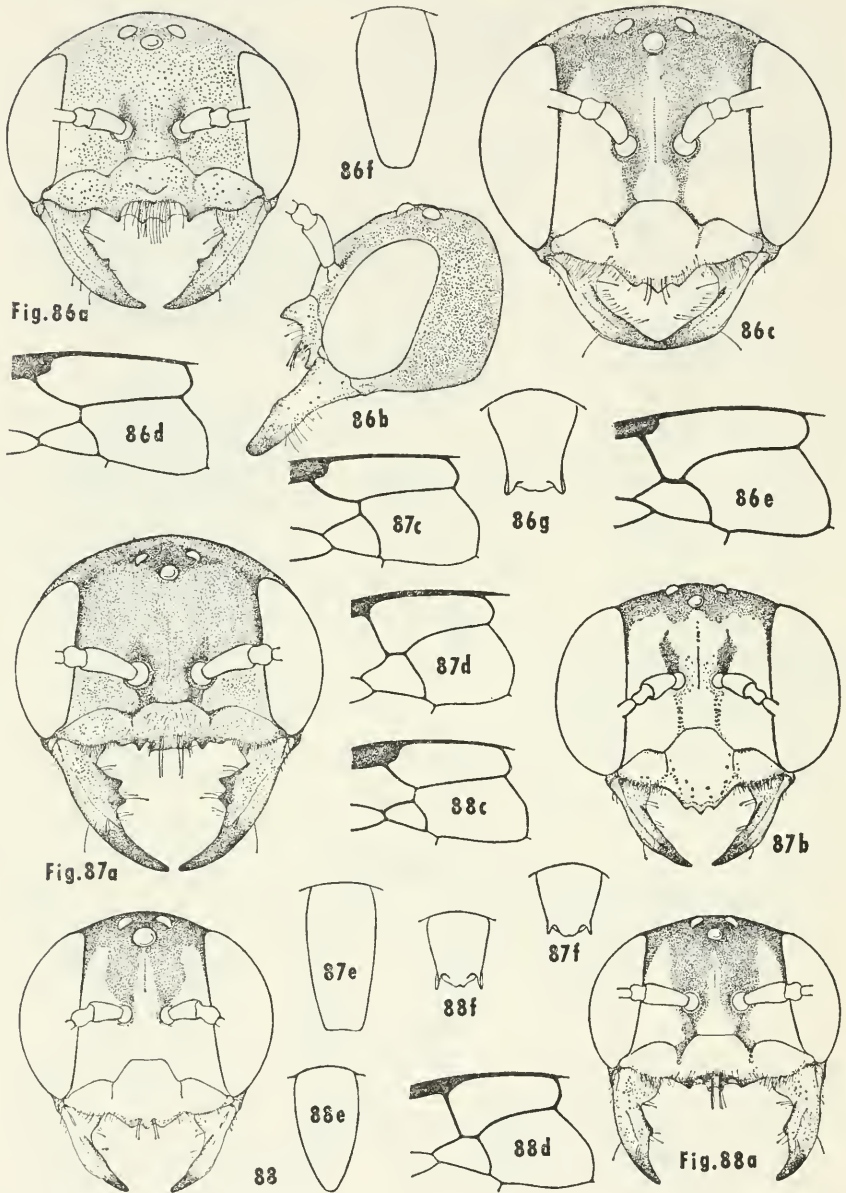
FIGURES 77-78.—77, *E. melanovittata* Scullen (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium); 78, *E. mellea* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium).



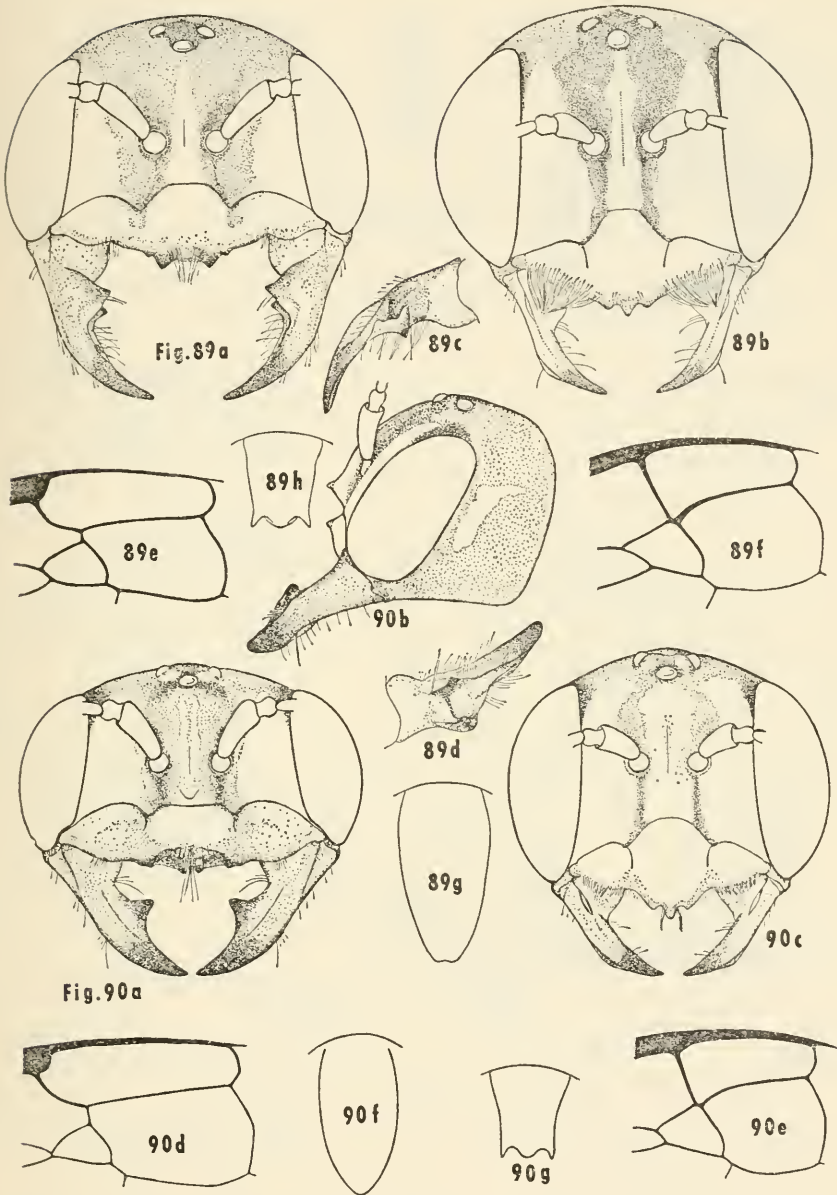
FIGURES 79-81.—79, *E. menkei* Scullen (a=female face, b=female mandible, c=female wing, d=female pygidium); 80, *E. mojavensis* Scullen (a=male face, b=male wing, c=male pygidium); 81, *E. montana* Cresson (a=female face, b=female profile, c=female mandible, d=male mandible, mesad, e=male mandible, ventral, f=female wing, g= male wing, h=female pygidium, i=male pygidium).



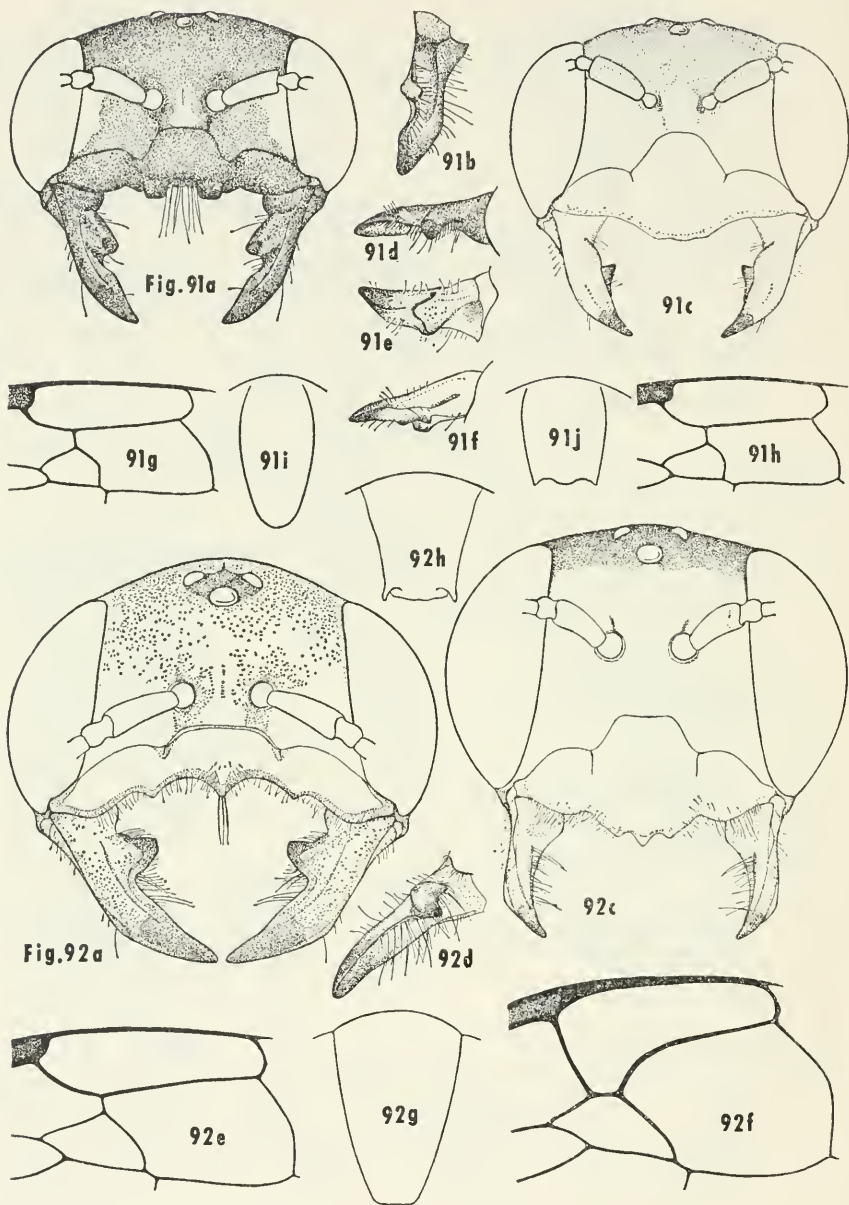
FIGURES 82-85.—82, *E. morula* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium); 83, *E. pacifica* Scullen (a=male face, b=male wing, c=male pygidium); 84, *E. pimarum* Rohwer (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium); 85, *E. punctifrons* (Cameron) (a=female face, b=female wing, c=female pygidium).



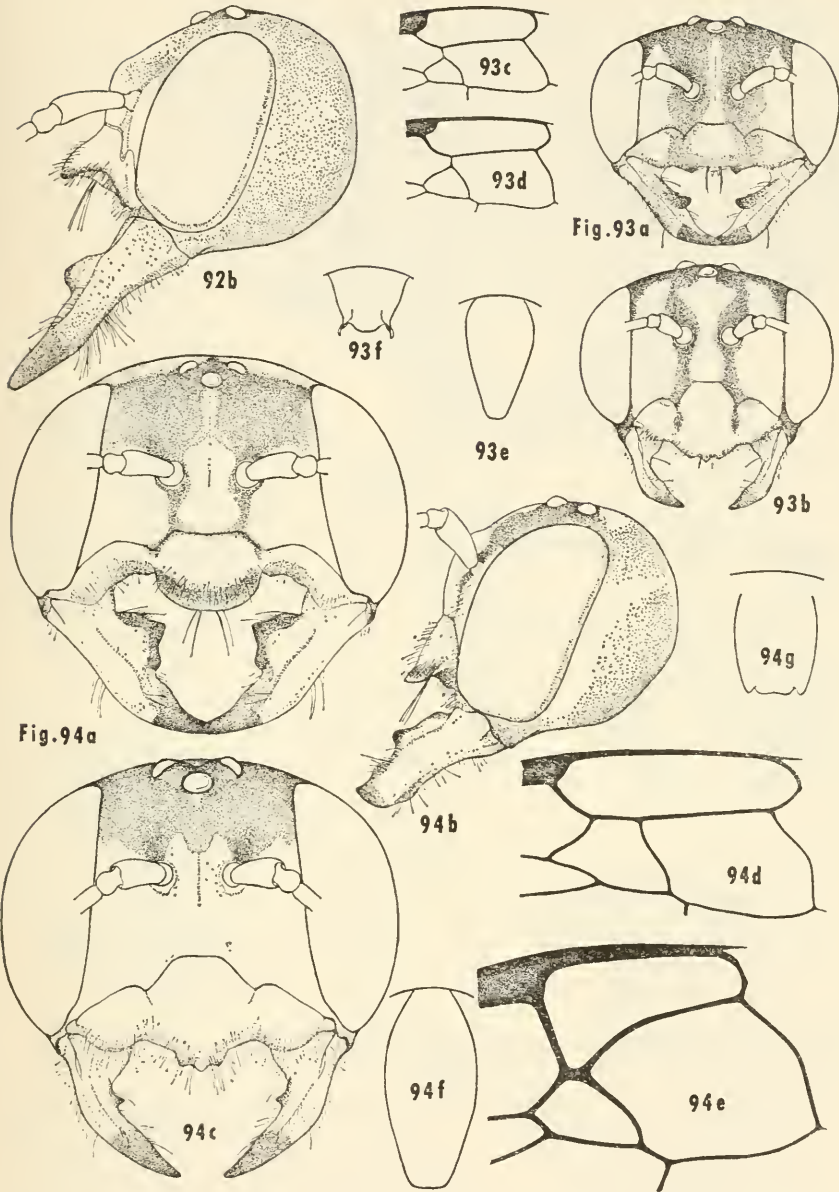
FIGURES 86-88.—86, *E. rubripes* Cresson (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium); 87, *E. ruficeps* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium); 88, *E. similis* Cresson (a=female face, b=male face, c=female wing, d=male wing, e=female pygidium, f=male pygidium).



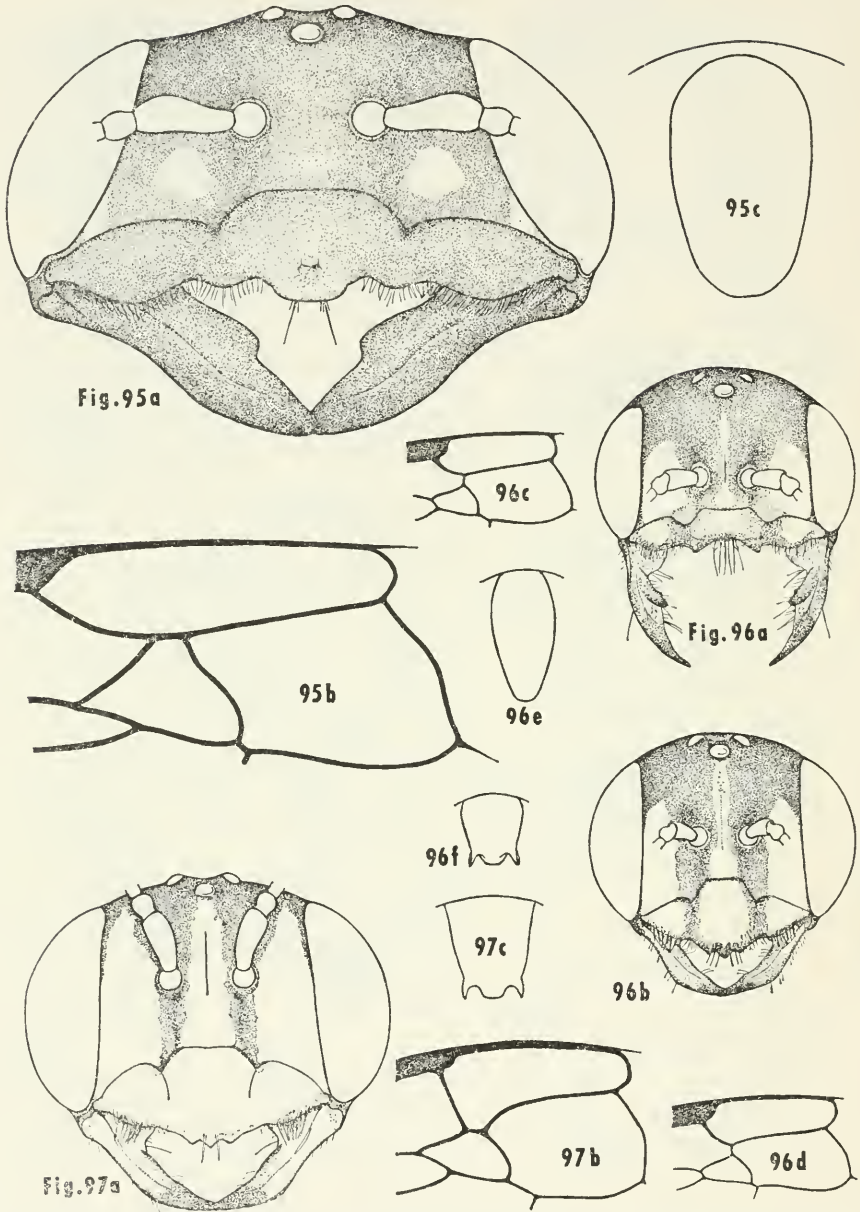
FIGURES 89-90.—89, *E. sinuata* Scullen (a=female face, b=male face, c=female mandible, dorsal, d=female mandible, mesal, e=female wing, f=male wing, g=female pygidium, h=male pygidium); 90, *E. sonorae* Scullen (a=female face, b=female profile, c=male face, d=female wing, e=male wing, f=female pygidium, g=male pygidium).

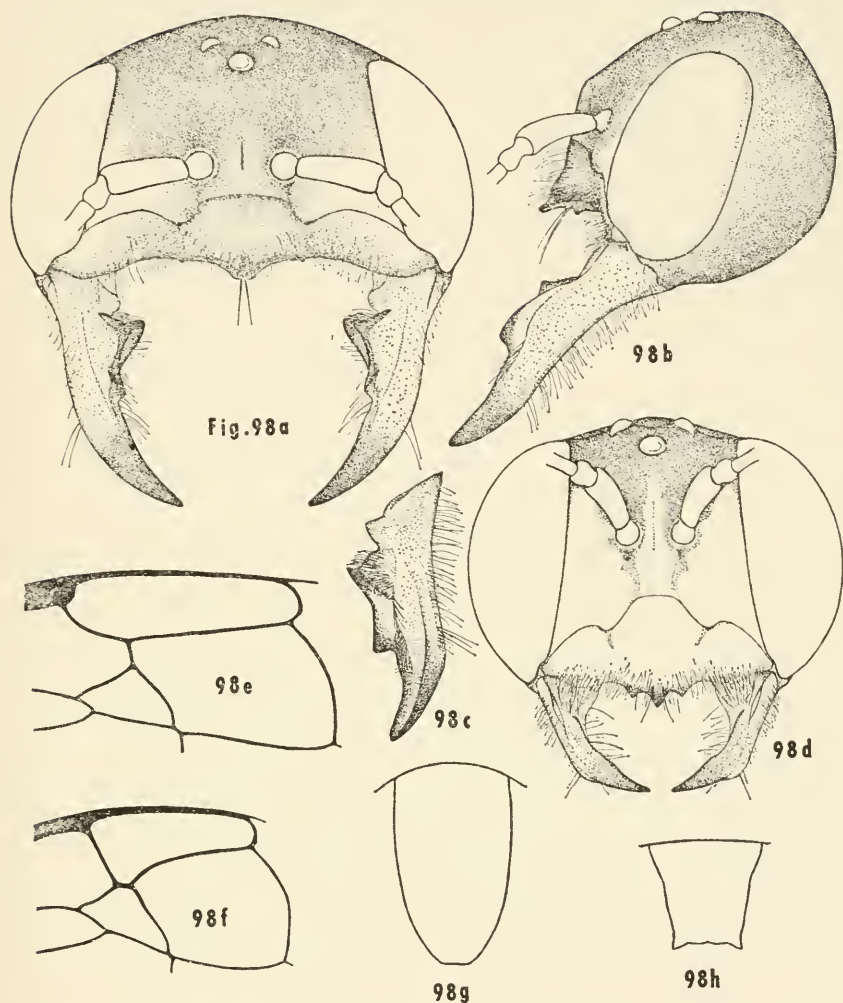


FIGURE 98.—*E. zonata* (Say) (a=female face, b=female profile, c=female mandible, d=male face, e=female wing, f=male wing, g=female pygidium, h=male pygidium).



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
