

BUDGET JUSTIFICATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1984

Submitted to the Committees on Appropriations
Congress of the United States



GENERAL STATEMENT

As a congressionally created presidential memorial the Wilson Center has established itself in the relatively short period of twelve years as a world-class institution for independent, advanced research. The Center is unique among such scholarly institutions in its active commitment to dialogue and direct communication with a broader public.

The Wilson Center's major request for increase in the federal budget for 1984 is central to its legislatively mandated mission and will essentially complete the process of providing a basic structure for its programs. This request is to place the four remaining key staff positions in its international programs in the federal budget (a total of \$162,000). This request results from a year-long-self-initiated examination of the Center's four international programs involving many outside commentators and consultants and a thorough evaluation of the Center's international activities. The highly positive conclusions of this outside review encouraged the Board of Trustees to renew these four programs for the next decade and to strengthen the argument included in this budget submission that the four remaining key administrative positions of the international programs are now part of the central structure of the Center and should therefore be included in the federal budget.

The remaining increase requested for fiscal year 1984 goes to annualizing the October 1982 federal pay increase and to bringing the Center's payment to the Smithsonian for administrative support up to a more realistic level.

With assurance of federal support for its proven core needs as a national institution, the Center will be able to continue its remarkable record of steadily increasing private support and participation in the Center's growing program of public dialogue and communication. The Center's ability to increase its annual private contributions from \$95,100 in FY 1973 to \$1,610,000 in FY 1982 not including the Wilson Quarterly, which is entirely privately funded—has been made possible by the assurance of federal funding for core needs. This current budget request will give the Center a federal vote of confidence in the scholarly integrity and international identity of a Center that has proven itself and has now been so positively evaluated. Henceforth, the Center's small but experienced and dedicated staff will be able to derive a higher return to the nation on this unique investment in a living presidential memorial by increasing the quality, variety, and impact of the communication to wider audiences of the meetings held and work done at the Center.

The Board of Trustees of the Wilson Center requests a federal appropriation for FY 1984 of \$2,568,000, an increase of \$227,000 over the Center's FY 1983 appropriation.

The increase would go to cover the following items which are explained more fully in the pages that follow:

1.	To complete institutionalization of Center's international programs by transferring the remaining four positions in these programs from the private to the federal payroll:	\$162,000
2.	To annualize the October 1982 federal pay raise of 4.%:	40,000
3.	To increase the Center's payment to the Smithsonian Institution for administrative support:	25,000

Analysis

The Center is continuing the practice, approved by the Congress in FY 1983, of tying average fellowship stipends to the GS-13, step one level of the federal pay scale.

The requested figure for FY 1984 (\$1,176,000 or \$33,600 per fellowship year) is identical to that requested in FY 1983 because the earlier year appropriation was approved only after the President had approved the amount for FY 1984. Subsequent requests to the Office of Management and Budget will reflect the then-current GS-13, step one level.

Analysis of Increase:

\$24,000 of this increase in personnel costs is to annualize the October 1982 pay raise. The balance of \$162,000 is to complete the institutionalization of the Center's international programs by transferring the four remaining positions in these programs from the private to the federal payroll.

The Center gives the highest priority to this step, as has been argued and documented for the past three years. These programs have proved themselves to be of great value, have been subject to exhaustive, self-initiated, outside evaluation resulting in long-term renewal of their mandates. Moreover, they have generated substantial international interest. In order to provide a dependable long-term institutional framework for international programs, the salaries and benefits of the two remaining program secretaries (GS-15 level) and two administrative assistants (GS-8 level) must become part of the basic structure of the presidential memorial.

The Congress approved the transfer of four positions in these programs to the federal payroll in fiscal year 1983. This FY 1984 request for four additional positions would complete the institutionalization of these programs.

We have now reached a critical point. Unless funding for administering its international programs can be secured, the Center will have to retrench these programs severely at the very time when they should be building upon the early experimental achievements. They have played a unique role in linking both the Washington policy community and the broader American scholarly community with the U.S.S.R., East Asia, Latin America, and Europe and the Middle East (the recent emphases of the International Security Studies Program) precisely when relations with each of these regions are entering a more critical period.

The Center began each of these international programs with private funding. We will continue to raise private funds—indeed to seek increasing amounts—for seminars, meetings, publications, and outreach activities in all these international programs and will strive as well to increase their impact. But private donors regard the core administration for a congressionally—created



presidential memorial as an appropriate federal cost. Private donors have made it clear that they will support core administrative costs of new programs only during the start-up period, which is now past. This federal support for basic staff costs is thus a prerequisite for most forms of continued private support for these international programs after this initial period. Having tested and perfected these programs for six years, staff support must now be institutionalized if they are to continue. International programs are essential if the Center is to fulfill the intention of the Congress that the official memorial to Woodrow Wilson be an international center linking ideas and action here in Washington.

Approval of the core costs for these four positions will not increase the present size of the Center or of its staff. We have held down staff size stringently over time on our federal budget. We did not request federal support for these positions in our international programs before 1982 because we wanted them to prove themselves by gaining initial outside support. They have now done this and have proven successful beyond our expectations. Without the requested increase, a remarkable series of international associations and activities that have taken many years to develop will simply not continue.

Analysis of Increase:

Again this year, as in FY 1983, we are requesting a payment to the Smithsonian of \$75,000, more adequately to cover the various administrative support functions which the Smithsonian provides to the Center.

This administrative support is unquestionably vital to the Center. We could not begin, for example, to take care of our own personnel and accounting needs without a very substantial increase in our budget level and in staff positions. The Smithsonian not only services the Center in these areas but also provides support in such areas as contracting, supply, general counsel, printing and photo services, building maintenance, and protection. If the Center had to provide these services out of its own resources, the cost would far exceed the \$75,000 requested for FY 1984.

No trustee of the Board chosen from private life shall be eligible to serve in excess of two consecutive terms, except that a trustee whose term has expired may serve until his successor has qualified.

(e) The President shall designate a Chairman and a Vice Chairman from among the members of the Board chosen from private life.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD

Sec. 4. (a) In administering the Center, the Board shall have all necessary and proper powers, which shall include but not be limited to the power to—

(1) appoint scholars, from the United States and abroad, and, where appropriate, provide stipends, grants, and fellowships to such scholars, and to hire or accept the voluntary services of consultants, advisory boards, and panels to aid the Board in carrying

out its responsibilities;

(2) solicit, accept, and dispose of gifts, bequests, and devices of money, securities, and other property of whatsoever character for the benefit of the Center; any such money, securities, or other property shall, upon receipt, be deposited with the Smithsonian Institution, and unless otherwise restricted by the terms of the gift, expenditures shall be in the discretion of the Board for the purposes of the Center;

(3) obtain grants from, and make contracts with, State, Federal, local, and private agencies, organizations, institutions, and

individuals;

(4) acquire such site as a location for the Center as may sub-

sequently be authorized by the Congress;

(5) acquire, hold, maintain, use, operate, and dispose of any physical facilities, including equipment, necessary for the operation of the Center;

- (6) appoint and fix the compensation and duties of the director and such other officers of the Center as may be necessary for the efficient administration of the Center; the director and two other officers of the Center may be appointed and compensated without regard to the provisions of title 5 of the United States Code governing appointments in the competitive service and chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title 5 of the United States Code; and
- (7) prepare plans and specifications for the Center, including the design and development of all buildings, facilities, open spaces, and other structures on the site in consultation with the President's Temporary Commission on Pennsylvania Avenue, or its successor, and with other appropriate Federal and local agencies, such plans to include an exterior classic frieze memorial to Woodrow Wilson.
- (b) The Board shall, in connection with acquisition of any site authorized by Congress, as provided for in paragraph (4) of subsection (a) of this section, provide, to businesses and residents displaced from any such site, relocation assistance, including payments and other benefits, equivalent to that nuthorized to displace businesses and residents under the Housing Act of 1949, as amended. The Board shall develop a relocation program for existing businesses and residents within the site and submit such program to the government of the District of Columbia for a determination as to its adequacy and feasibility. In providing such relocation assistance and developing

DECLARATION OF POLICY

SEC. 2. The Congress hereby finds and declares—

(1) that a living institution expressing the ideals and concerns of Woodrow Wilson would be an appropriate memorial to his accomplishments as the twenty-eighth President of the United States, a distinguished scholar, an outstanding university president, and a brilliant advocate of international understanding;

(2) that the Woodrow Wilson Memorial Commission, created by joint resolution of Congress, recommended that an International Center for Scholars be constructed in the District of Columbia in the area north of the proposed Market Square as part of the Nation's memorial to Woodrow Wilson;

(3) that such a center, symbolizing and strengthening the fruitful relation between the world of learning and the world of public affairs, would be a suitable memorial to the spirit of Woodrow Wilson; and

(4) that the establishment of such a center would be consonant with the purposes of the Smithsonian Institution, created by Congress in 1846 "for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among

THE CENTER AND THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Sec. 3. (a) There is hereby established in the Smithsonian Institu- Woodrow Wilson tion a Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars and a International Board of Trustees of the Center (hereinafter referred to as the "Center" and the "Board"), whose duties it shall be to maintain and administer the Center and site thereof and to execute such other functions as are vested in the Board by this Act.

(b) The Board of Trustees shall be composed of fifteen members as Membership. follows:

(1) the Secretary of State;
(2) the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare;
(3) the Chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities;

(4) the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution;

(5) the Librarian of Congress;

(6) the Archivist of the United States;(7) one appointed by the President from time to time from within the Federal Government; and

(8) eight appointed by the President from private life.

(c) Each member of the Board of Trustees specified in paragraphs (1) through (7) of subsection (b) may designate another official to serve on the Board of Trustees in his stead.

(d) Each member of the Board of Trustees appointed under para- Tom. graph (8) of subsection (b) shall serve for a term of six years from the expiration of his predecessor's term; except that (1) any trustee appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which his predecessor was appointed shall be appointed for the remainder of such term, and (2) the terms of office of the trustees first taking office shall begin on the date of the enactment of this Act,

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ADMINISTRATION

Sec. 5. The Board is authorized to adopt an official seal which shall be judicially noticed and to make such bylaws, rules, and regulations as it deems necessary for the administration of its functions under this Act, including, among other matters, bylaws, rules, and regulations relating to the administration of its trust funds and the organization and procedure of the Board. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

APPROPRIATION

Sec. 6. There are hereby authorized to be appropriated to the Board such funds as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act: Provided. That no more than \$200,000 shall be authorized for appropriation through fiscal year 1970 and no part of that appropriation shall be available for construction purposes.

RECORDS AND AUDIT

Sec. 7. The accounts of the Board shall be audited in accordance with the principles and procedures applicable to, and as part of, the audit of the other Federal and trust funds of the Smithsonian Institution.
