The Committee on Appropriations, to which was referred the bill (H.R. 8917) making appropriations for the Department of the Interior and related agencies for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1974, and for other purposes reports the same to the Senate with various amendments and presents herewith information relative to the changes recommended:

### SUMMARY OF BILL

Estimates totaling \$2,575,667,300, which include new obligational authority and amounts necessary to liquidate contract authorization, were considered by the Committee for the programs and activities of the agencies and bureaus of the Department of the Interior—except the Alaska Power Administration, the Southeastern Power Administration, the Southwestern Power Administration, the Bonneville

Power Administration, the Bureau of Reclamation, and research on underground electric transmission—and the following related agencies:

Forest Service (Department of Agriculture).

Commission of Fine Arts.

Indian Health Service, Health Services and Mental Health Administration and Indian Education Act, Office of Education (Department of Health, Education, and Welfare).

Indian Claims Commission.

National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities.

Smithsonian Institution.

National Gallery of Art.

Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial Commission.

American Revolution Bicentennial Commission.

National Council on Indian Opportunity.

Federal Metal and Nonmetallic Mine Safety Board of Review.

Joint Federal—State Land Use Planning Commission for Alaska.

Pennsylvania Avenue Development Corporation.

The Committee recommends appropriations totaling \$2,679,823,700 (\$2,318,519,700 for definite appropriations, \$170,104,000 for indefinite appropriations of receipts, and \$191,200,000 to liquidate contract authorizations) for the programs and activities of these agencies. The sum recommended by the Committee is an increase of \$104,156,400 over the budget estimates considered, an increase of \$219,069,500 over the sums included in the House bill, and a reduction of \$181,632,600 in the appropriations for fiscal year 1973.

It is estimated that the agencies included in this bill will produce \$2,930,700,158 in receipts during fiscal year 1973.

In addition to hearing witnesses from the government agencies, the Committee heard all Members of Congress and public witnesses who indicated a desire to appear before the Committee. As a result of these hearings, and of numerous communications, the Committee considered, in addition to the budget estimates, several hundred proposed amendments, which, if all had been approved, would have increased this bill by more than one and one-half billion dollars, or over 50 percent.

#### BUDGET PRIORITIES

Budget proposals for the Department of the Interior and the related agencies covered by the bill presented the Committee with conflicting priorities that were difficult to resolve. Programs important to forest resources, wildlife, and recreation activities and Federal land acquisition were sharply curtailed in the President's budget. Increases for energy research were considered inadequate to meet the Nation's growing demands and its need to make greater use of domestic energy resources within the environmental restrictions that are being imposed. Budgets for Indian health services and facilities were tightly constrained, and there was no request at all to continue assistance to Indian students under the Indian Education Act.

At the same time, the President's budget recommended substantial increases for bicentennial and cultural activities.

Despite a determined effort to curb spending programs, the Committee found it necessary to recommend substantial additions to the

budget in several areas. Selected reductions elsewhere were made after careful consideration by the Committee. None will curtail ongoing programs.

Major increases proposed by the Committee are in areas of energy research and development, recreation and wildlife resources, forestry, and Indian health and education. These increases may be found in the accounts of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Land and Water Conservation Fund, Bureau of Mines, Office of Coal Research, Forest Service, Indian Health Service, and the Indian Education Act.

Despite these increases, the Committee was able to hold total appropriations \$181,632,600 below fiscal year 1973 appropriations.

#### INDIAN PROGRAMS

For programs funded in this bill, the President's budget proposed more than \$824,600,000 for programs benefiting Indians through the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Indian Health Service. To this, the Committee's recommendation adds more than \$85 million with the emphasis on health and education programs. The bulk of the increase—\$65 million—was in the Indian Education Act for which there was no budget request.

In addition to the programs mentioned above, it is estimated on the basis of the President's budget that \$245,085,000 will be available from other Federal agencies (exclusive of social security and veterans benefits) in fiscal year 1974. The following table sets forth these sums for fiscal year 1972 through 1974:

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$83,932,000, a reduction of \$7,415,000 in the budget estimate and an increase of \$60,000 in the House allowance. The recommendation sustains the House denial of \$7,400,000 to supervise construction of the Trans-Alaska pipeline, which has not yet received final clearance. Reductions of \$50,000 in off-road vehicle management and \$25,000 in general administration are also recommended, along with an increase of \$60,000 for completion of the Murry Canyon watershed project, Nevada.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$6,300,000, the same as the budget estimate and House allowance, and joins with the House in calling for more realistic budget estimates in the future to meet public recreation needs on federal lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management.

The Committee is concerned over the failure of the budget estimate to provide for temporary staff housing in remote areas of Alaska to accommodate field implementation of the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act. The Department is directed to prepare estimates for the first available supplemental appropriation bill.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$302,050,000, an increase of \$765,000 in the total budget estimate as amended and \$2,074,000 over the House allowance.

On July 1, 1973, the President requested an additional appropriation to the Bureau of Indian Affairs of \$4,213,000 to cover federal expenses related to the recent disturbance on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation at Wounded Knee, South Dakota. Revised billings from Federal agencies subsequently reduced this amount to \$3,528,000, and the \$685,000 reduction is reflected in the Committee recommendation. The appropriation covers additional costs of \$2,478,000 incurred by the U.S. Marshals Service and \$1,050,000 by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The Committee recommends unbudgeted increases of \$1,450,000 as follows:

- \$140,000—Operation of St. Francis School, South Dakota.
- \$600,000—Operation of Navajo Community College, Arizona.
- \$65,000—Operation of the Busby School, Montana.
- \$200,000—Operation of the Sinte Gleska Community College and Lakota Higher Education Center, South Dakota.
- \$200,000—Operation of the Ramah Navajo School, New Mexico.
- \$120,000—Operating costs and facilities, United Tribes Employment Training Center, Bismarck, North Dakota.
- \$125,000—Graduate studies in agriculture for Indians, Oklahoma State University.

The Committee considers the housing programs of the Bureau to be important to the social and economic progress of Indians and Alaska Natives and is concerned over reports that the BIA housing division may be merged with social services. It directs the Bureau to avoid any internal reorganization that would tend to downgrade the Division of Housing or hinder its effectiveness. No consolidation of this division with another should be undertaken without consultation with the Committee.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$86,108,000, an increase of \$750,000 in the budget estimate and \$86,000 in the House allowance.

\$250,000—Assistance to tribal governments.

\$50,000—Assistance to the Visual Arts Center of Alaska.

\$100,000—Work-learn program.

Within available funds, the Committee directs that four housing officers be assigned to Alaska to implement an agreement with the Department of Housing and Urban Development involving the construction of 500 Native housing units. It is anticipated that the joint BIA-HUD agreement for this accelerated housing program will produce cost savings in excess of \$17,000,000.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$48,287,000, an increase of \$4,287,000 in the budget estimate and a reduction of \$5,056,000 in the House allowance.

The net increase in the recommendation is made up of a total budget addition of \$6,217,000 and concurrence in the House recommendation to reprogram \$1,930,000 in FY 1973 appropriations for the Haskell Junior College, Kansas, that would not be obligated until FY 1975.

Committee increases are as follows:

\$223,000—Classrooms and related facilities, Pryor Elementary School, Montana.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$4,396,000, the same as the House allowance and a reduction of \$40,000 in the budget estimate.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$87,223,000, an increase of \$32 million in the budget estimate and \$16 million in the House allowance. Together with unobligated appropriations carried forward from fiscal year 1973, the committee recommendation makes a total of \$335,669,000 available for obligation in fiscal year 1974. The recommended increases are summarized in the following table:

*State assistance:* The Committee directs that \$20,000,000 of the \$66,000,000 provided for state assistance be directed to those states which are exhausting prior year allocations. These allocations supplied on a need basis should have no effect on allocations of future appropriations. Twenty or more states are expected to exhaust prior year allocations during FY 1974.

In certain instances involving flood rehabilitation the Secretary has accepted the value of rededicated public lands to meet state matching fund requirements of the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act. The committee questions the propriety of this action and directs that practice be discontinued unless specific Congressional approval is obtained.

The Committee recommendation makes available for state assistance a total of \$202,000,000 in carryover and new appropriations for obligation in FY 1974.

The Committee has revised the language of the House-passed bill to permit states to match Land and Water Conservation Fund grants in amounts greater than 50 percent.

*Federal programs:* The Committee has provided \$16,000,000 in new funding, making a total of \$128,355,000 available for obligation in FY 1974. The budget estimate proposed obligating only \$80,000,000 of the \$112,355,000 in prior year appropriations.

The Committee directs that \$5,000,000 in previous appropriations no longer needed for National Park Service acquisition at Cape Cod, Homestead, Minute Man, Point Reyes and Voyageurs units be re-programmed and utilized, with \$12,000,000 in new funding, for the following acquisition programs:

- Golden Gate National Recreation Area, \$10,000,000.
- Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area, \$5,000,000.
- Park Service inholding acquisitions, \$2,000,000.

The balance of \$4,000,000 is for Forest Service acquisition in the Lake Tahoe Basin, California.

The Committee is distressed at the failure of the Administration to obligate fully the appropriations requested by the President and appropriated by the Congress from the Land and Water Conservation Fund for federal land acquisition in FY 1973. It directs that the total funds made available by this bill be utilized to the maximum extent possible in FY 1974. The cost of acquiring lands in presently authorized areas of the National Park System alone is estimated at more than \$245 million, and this cost is increasing at a rate of about 10 percent annually. The Committee expects a more realistic budget estimate based on an aggressive acquisition program in FY 1975.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$14,500,000, a decrease of \$500,000 in both the budget estimate and House allowance. The reduction applies to the \$1,000,000 requested for the Guam Economic Development Loan Fund. The committee has learned that less than \$400,000 of the initial \$1,000,000 appropriated for FY 1973 was obligated by June 30, 1973. More than \$1,100,000 will be available for obligation in FY 1974 under the committee recommendation.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$47,776,000, an \$8,224,000 reduction in the budget estimate. Legislation authorizing Trust Territory appropriations was enacted subsequent to House passage of this bill.

The Committee has denied the request for \$8,224,000 in grants for construction on the basis that more than \$17,000,000 in prior year funds was unobligated on June 30, 1973.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$162,190,000, an increase of \$6,190,000 in the budget request and \$6,216,000 over the House allowance. The net increase consists of reductions of \$100,000 in the Resource and Land Information program and \$214,000 for relocation of personnel to the Reston, Virginia, National Center, and increases of \$700,000 in the Earth Resources Observation System (EROS), \$5,354,000 for the Federal-State water resources program, \$300,000 for geothermal studies and \$150,000 for a comparative study of U.S. and Canadian programs to stimulate mineral resource activities.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$151,324,000, an increase of \$14,500,000 in the budget estimate and \$5,900,000 above the House allowance. The recommended increase consists of the following additions to the budget proposal:

\$1,500,000—To initiate design and construction of a pilot plant for converting wood waste to oil, Albany, Oregon.

\$300,000—Research on subsurface disposal of industrial wastes, Bartlesville, Oklahoma, and Morgantown, West Virginia.

\$2,000,000—Research on non-nuclear stimulation of oil and gas.

\$700,000—Research and demonstration on mine subsidence, Rock Springs, Wyoming.

\$500,000—Research and development of alumina, Boulder City, Nevada

\$7,500,000—Improved coal mining technology.

\$2,000,000—Energy economic analysis and research on energy conservation.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$95,000,000, increasing the budget estimate by \$42,500,000. The recommendation is \$33,500,000 above the House allowance and consists of the following program additions:

\$3,000,000—To reactivate the coal liquifaction pilot plant, Cresap, West Virginia. The Office of Coal Research is directed to utilize \$2,000,000 in unobligated funds previously appropriated for this project.

\$3,000,000—To expand research on Magnetohydrodynamics (MHD), including cooperative programs with the Soviet Union and the initiation of pilot plant design.

\$4,000,000—To accelerate construction of a solvent refined coal pilot plant, Ft. Lewis, Washington (\$3,000,000), and to initiate design of a demonstration plant (\$1,000,000).

\$500,000—Improved coal combustion techniques.

Additionally, the Committee has approved general increases of \$20 million for coal liquefaction and \$12 million for coal gasification, including \$3,400,000 for project COED, New Jersey, to strengthen existing research and development programs and to initiate new efforts.

The Committee is cognizant of the President's June 29, 1973, message proposing a \$100 million increase in fiscal year 1974 for energy research, approximately half of it for coal research. In the absence of a budget estimate, the Committee has elected to provide a substantial program increase on the basis of available research priorities established by the Department. The Committee expects an early supplemental budget estimate detailing further needs in coal research and other energy-related research funded in this bill.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$2,585,000 in agreement with the \$1,100,000 increase in the original budget estimate approved by the House, but \$13,560,000 below the revised request. The added funds will provide 50 additional positions to help the Office of Oil and Gas meet its rapidly widening responsibilities under the voluntary petroleum allocation program and other duties related to fuel supply problems.

Little more than a week before the Committee met to report the bill the President submitted a budget amendment requesting an additional \$14,660,000 for the Office of Oil and Gas to accomplish "major revision and improvement of the petroleum allocation program." The Department has stated that a mandatory allocation program was likely, and the Committee was given to understand the announcement of this program was imminent, but it was not forthcoming when the Committee met to report this bill.

The Committee cannot responsibly recommend a major increase for this office at the last moment on the basis of a nonexistent program. The Administration is urged to expedite its petroleum policy revisions, and the Committee will extend prompt and sympathetic consideration to an early supplemental estimate.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$80,377,000, an increase of \$1,373,000 over the budget request and \$240,000 above the House allowance. The Committee concurs in the House reduction of \$100,000 for preparation of environmental impact statements and recommends the following increases:

\$1,250,000—General wildlife refuse management, including \$25,000 for the Mason Neck Wildlife Refuge, Virginia.

\$200,000—Increased animal damage control.

\$23,000—Millen aquarium and hatchery, Georgia.

Studies in the Malheur-Harney Basin are to be continued within available funds.

The Committee shares the concern of the House committee over the failure of the budget estimates to provide for on-going wildlife refuge management and hatchery production and expects these activities to be adequately supported within the funding provided. It endorses the direction that the committees be consulted before any refuge or hatchery operation is transferred to state management.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$5,933,000, reducing the budget estimate by \$3,300,000 and the House allowance by \$6,913,500. The reduction in the budget request consists of \$5,000,000 deleted from the Bureau's \$7,100,000 water pollution abatement proposal and an increase of \$1,700,000 for individual construction projects.

Of the total water pollution abatement request, \$6,425,000 in the budget estimate was earmarked for construction of effluent treatment facilities at 34 national fish hatcheries and one research facility. Evaluation of various abatement types is still underway, and the Environmental Protection Agency has not yet developed guidelines for hatcheries. The Bureau was unable to demonstrate that all the requested funding could be effectively obligated. Accordingly, the committee recommends deferral of \$5,000,000 until adequate planning and design are complete.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$7,100,000 as an advance for wetlands acquisition, the same as the FY 1973 appropriation. There was no budget estimate or House allowance.

The recommendation continues the practice of providing an advance appropriation together with an estimated \$7,000,000 in receipts from migratory bird hunting stamps for priority waterfowl habitat purchases as authorized by the Wetlands Acquisition Act. The committee believes this program is too important to defer and directs that the total estimated funding available be fully obligated.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$187,577,000, an increase of \$10,797,000 in the budget request and \$10,857,000 over the House allowance. While concurring in the House reduction of \$60,000 in the bicentennial parks interpretive program, the committee has recommended a budget increase of \$10,857,000 for park management. This is an effort to offset at least partially the unacceptable \$28,000,000 deficiency in management needs acknowledged by Park Service officials in testimony before the committee.

The highest priority management needs provided by the Park Service at the Committee's request total \$10,525,000 and involve 178 additional permanent and 294 part-time positions. They are distributed by region as follows:

- \$1,205,000—National Capital Parks.
- \$1,486,000—Northeast.
- \$1,757,000—Southeast.
- \$1,734,000—Midwest.
- \$2,072,000—Western.
- \$1,144,000—Pacific Northwest.
- \$1,127,000—Southwest.

The Committee has also included \$332,000 for communication facilities, Lake Mead National Recreation Area, Nevada-Arizona.

The budget approved by the Committee will also finance the operation of new facilities in 30 park units and provide initial funding for 11 new areas and three existing units.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$15,559,000, a reduction of \$4,000,000 in the budget estimate. The grant portion was subsequently authorized and was considered in full by the Committee.

The reduction of \$4,000,000 relates to the new bicentennial grant portion of the budget request as a result of the committee's careful assessment of overall Park Service priorities.

It is the Committee's intent that the funds provided for bicentennial grants shall be equitably apportioned among the revolutionary historical locales and not concentrated in any one state or city.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$28,995,000 for this new account derived from recreation fee receipts. This is a \$3,930,000 reduction in the budget estimate and \$2,536,000 below the House allowance.

In its assessment of overall Park Service needs, which resulted in recommended increases elsewhere, the Committee has deleted relatively low priority development projects in the budget estimate as follows:

\$1,052,000—Reflecting pool reconstruction (\$973,000) and cherry tree lighting (\$79,000), National Capital Parks.

\$330,000—Facility improvements and archeology excavation, Independence Hall National Historical Park.

\$1,154,000—Fort Moultrie visitor facilities, Fort Sumpter National Monument.

Related road and trail construction totaling \$321,000 is deleted in a separate account.

The Committee has restored \$1,315,000 for visitor facilities in Constitution Gardens, National Capital Parks, deleted by the House. It is the Committee's belief that these facilities on the Mall are badly needed for the 1976 bicentennial year and beyond.

The Committee commends the Park Service for its efforts to provide alternatives to automobile travel in park units, thereby reducing traffic congestion and enhancing the natural environment of the parks. However, the Committee directs the Park Service also to consider the needs of families visiting the national parks by automobile. Parents with young children cannot always easily avail themselves of public transportation, and the efforts of the Park Service to control traffic should not neglect the plight of families relying by necessity on the automobile for park visits.

The recommendation contains \$3,000,000 for matching grants and \$3,170,000 for individual water research efforts under Title II of the authorizing Act.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$3,727,000, an increase of \$1,200,000 in the budget estimate. The FY 1974 program was not authorized at the time the House considered the bill. Together with a carryover of \$6,675,000 in FY 1973 appropriations, the recommendation permits a total program of seawater and brackish water desalinization research of \$10,402,000.

The budget addition recommended by the committee will provide \$1,000,000 to continue operations of the Roswell, New Mexico, pilot plant. The budget estimate contemplated closure of this facility, but the Committee considers the brackish water research conducted at Roswell an important factor in continuing Colorado River salinity negotiations with Mexico.

The Committee has also included an addition of \$600,000 to strengthen operations at the Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina, test facility.

In proposing sharp reductions in desalinization research and development, the Administration asserted that many conversion techniques had been developed to the point that private industry could assume the cost of ongoing work. The Committee will expect the Administration to demonstrate the validity of this position with concrete evidence that this important work is indeed being carried forward.

In addition to the Roswell and Wrightsville Beach plants, the program recommended by the Committee will emphasize research on freezing process and sea water membrane technology, and continue operations at the Fountain Valley, California, facility.

The budget request included saline water research as an account in the Office of the Secretary. However, after several revisions in its reorganization plan, the Department re-established the Office of Saline Water as a separate activity. The Committee therefore recommends continued funding of this activity under the Office of Saline Water.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$16,026,000, a reduction of \$2,900,000 in the revised budget estimate and an increase of \$531,000 in the House allowance.

Of a \$3,031,000 increase in the budget estimate, which was not considered by the House, \$2,000,000 was for contract energy economic studies and data analysis. The Committee has approved this amount but included it in the Bureau of Mines budget under the Bureau's data collection and analysis activity.

The balance of the budget amendment, \$1,031,000, included 45 new positions and related expenses for the Department's newly created Office of Energy Conservation and Office of Energy Data and Analysis. Only a few weeks before the submission of the budget amendment the Department testified that no new positions would be needed to accomplish a proposed Departmental reorganization that included the creation of these offices. Because of the late arrival of the budget amendment, the Committee had no opportunity to conduct hearings on the abrupt change in policy. Accordingly, the Committee recommends a \$500,000 reduction in the portion dealing with additional positions. The Committee will expect the Department to detail and justify its needs more fully in the first available supplemental appropriation estimates.

The Committee has concurred in the House reduction of \$400,000 in operating expenses of the Office of the Secretary.

Recommendations from the Department for the allocation of funds proposed for the fund were helpful to the committee in its consideration of energy-related increases.

The Committee's recommended increase stems from its deep concern over the severe cutbacks imposed on essential forestry programs in the budget estimate, compounding the refusal of the Administration to obligate additional funds provided by the Congress in FY 1973. This nation will not tolerate continued neglect of its natural resource heritage, and the Committee directs that the added amounts provided in the bill be fully obligated. The Committee will also expect a more realistic and responsible budget program from the Administration in FY 1975.

Increases recommended by the Committee are listed below, followed by a table summarizing the changes by activity:

- \$9,000,000—Reforestation and timber stand improvement.
- \$1,000,000—Recreation and public-use management.
- \$1,000,000—Project SEAM (Surface Environment and Mining).
- \$195,000—Stream rehabilitation in Alaska.
- \$65,000—North Kings deer herd management, California

The Committee concurs in House reductions of \$560,000 for log exports and \$63,000 for visitor information services.

The Administration failed to submit a budget amendment in support of the recently announced increase in the timber sales program.

The Committee was unable to determine why a revised estimate was not forthcoming. It expects one in the form of an early supplemental estimate, which will be given prompt attention.

The Committee has recommended a modification of House language in the Administrative Provisions prohibiting regional realignments by the Forest Service. The changes extend the prohibition to regional and research offices but permit regional revisions with the consent of the Congressional committees on Appropriations and Agriculture.

Under General Provisions in the bill, the Committee also recommends modifications in the House-approved ban on log exports to exempt surplus species and to exclude the State of Alaska from the ban.

As part of its FY 1974 program, the Forest Service seeks Committee approval for reprogramming the FY 1973 impoundments.

The Committee denies \$4,029,000 of the reprogramming and directs that the funds be obligated for the projects for which they were originally appropriated. The projects and amounts follow:

The failure of the Administration to allow any program increase in health services to Indians and Alaska Natives deeply disturbed the Committee. After a careful examination of high priority needs the Committee elected to recommend the following general increases:

- \$2,000,000—Contract health care.
- \$2,000,000—Ambulatory care, including \$1,200,000 for patient care and \$800,000 for field health.

\$250,000—Mental health.

\$450,000—California Rural Indian Health Board.

\$500,000—Tribal health program development.

Within the expanded programs of contract and ambulatory health care, the Committee expects the Indian Health Service to continue the FY 1973 increases for eye care and treatment of otitis media, for expanded dental services in the Aberdeen and Billings area, and for services at Belcourt, North Dakota.

The increased program will also include the following additional services:

Dental care, Wind River Reservation, Wyoming.

Support for the development of Native health corporations in Bristol Bay, Kodiak, the Aleutian Chain, Tanana Chiefs area, and the Arctic Slope region.

Implementation of a comprehensive environmental health program, Norton Sound Health Corporation, Alaska.

Employment of two additional physicians within the Norton Sound region, Alaska.

The Committee has also approved additional appropriations of \$165,000 to continue the leasing of health clinics in Alaskan villages and \$500,000 for health centers at Hugo, McAlester and Eufaula, Oklahoma.

The Department is commended for its decision to obligate the additional funds provided by Congress in FY 1973 following the refusal of Congress to rescind them. The Committee has been assured that all the \$6,208,000 involved in the rescission proposal will be obligated.

Part B will improve educational opportunities of Indian children with grants to support planning, pilot and demonstration projects, development of school programs and dissemination of special information and materials.

Part C provides a program similar to Part B for adult Indian education.

The recommendation does, however, provide an increase of \$40,236,000 from the previous year. Separately, the Committee has also approved the full authorization for matching grants, providing a total increase of more than \$56,200,000 in overall availability of funds for arts and humanities programs.
