Collecting Permits from RENARE for 1979

Anyone affiliated to STRI wishing to obtain the 1979 permit for collecting specimens of plants, birds, small mammals, amphibians, reptiles, fresh water fish, and insects in the Republic of Panama must fill out a request form giving certain information requested by the Department of Natural Renewable Resources (RENARE). Everyone (including assistants) who collects any of the above mentioned specimens in Panamanian terrirory must have a valid permit. Request forms can be obtained from the Office of Conservation and Environmental Education (from Dr. N. Smythe or Mrs. G. de Alba) at the Tivoli.
