Information on the evolution and phylogeny of heritable microbes and their implications for sexual reproduction and speciation will be presented.



150th Anniversary of the Smithsonian Institution

By the President of the United States of America

A Proclamation

When James Smithson, an English scientist, died in 1829, he gave his entire estate "to the United States of America, to found at Washington, under the name Smithsonian Institution, an Establishment for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men." This extraordinary gift, amounting to one and one-half times the Federal budget of the day, led to passage of an Act of Congress establishing the Smithsonian Institution. Signed by President James Polk on August 10, 1846, this legislation created a Board of Regents to oversee the execution of Smithson's trust.

Today, 150 years later, the Smithsonian Institution is famed around the globe, and its collections are enjoyed by thousands of Americans and foreign visitors every day. Through dedicated original research, the preservation of an unequalled collection of artifacts, and the presentation of public exhibitions and programs, the Smithsonian truly embodies its benefactor's dream. As one of the foremost repositories of American heritage and culture, the Institution provides unique insight into our history and the development of our vibrant national character.

As we celebrate the sesquicentennial of the Smithsonian Institution, let us recognize the work done by its many museums, research facilities, and educational endeavors and rededicate ourselves to the "increase and diffusion of knowledge" James Smithson sought to advance. In doing so, we can more fully explore the wonders of our world and continue to bring people together for the common pursuit of knowledge.

Now, Therefore, I, William J. Clinton, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the United States, and in honor of the memory of James Smithson and to commemorate the accomplishments of the Smithsonian Institution, do hereby proclaim August 10, 1996, as the 150th Anniversary of the Smithsonian Institution and urge the people of the United States to observe this anniversary with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand this seventh day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and ninety-six, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and twentieth.

**Pronunciamiento
del Presidente
de los Estados Unidos de América**

7 de febrero de 1996

**150avo. Aniversario
de la Institución Smithsonian**

Cuando James Smithson, un científico inglés, murió en 1829, legó sus bienes en fideicomiso "a los Estados Unidos de América, para fundar, en Washington, bajo el nombre de Institución Smithsonian, una entidad dedicada al enriquecimiento y difusión del conocimiento entre los hombres." Esta herencia extraordinaria, que sumó uno y medio del presupuesto federal para un día, se convirtió en ley de la nación, estableciéndose la Institución Smithsonian. Una vez firmada por el Presidente James Polk el 10 de agosto de 1846, esta legislación creó el Directorio que se encargaría de administrar los fondos de Smithson.

Hoy, 150 años después, la Institución Smithsonian es famosa alrededor del mundo, y todos los días miles de norteamericanos y visitantes del extranjero disfrutan de sus colecciones. A través de dedicadas investigaciones originales, la preservación de colecciones de artefactos únicos y la presentación de exhibiciones y programas públicos, el Smithsonian realmente personifica el sueño de su benefactor. Como uno de los depositarios más importantes de la herencia y cultura americanas, la Institución ofrece conocimientos únicos sobre nuestra historia y el desarrollo de nuestro vibrante carácter nacional.

Al celebrar el 150avo aniversario de la Institución Smithsonian, reconocemos el trabajo realizado por todos sus museos, centros de investigación y programas educativos, y dediquémonos nuevamente al "enriquecimiento y difusión del conocimiento" que James Smithson quiso promover. Al hacerlo podremos explorar más las maravillas de nuestro mundo y continuar agrupando a la gente en búsqueda de la sabiduría para todos.

Por lo tanto, ahora, yo, William J. Clinton, Presidente de los Estados Unidos de América, por la autoridad que me concede la Constitución y las leyes de los Estados Unidos, y en honor a la memoria de James Smithson, y para conmemorar los logros de la Institución Smithsonian, declaro por este medio al 10 de agosto de 1996 como el 150avo. aniversario de la Institución Smithsonian, y exhorto a todos los ciudadanos de los Estados Unidos a celebrar este aniversario con las ceremonias y actividades apropiadas.

Y en testimonio de lo dicho, apunto mi firma este día siete de febrero de los mil novecientos noventa y seis años del Señor y los doscientos veinte años de la Independencia de los Estados Unidos de América.


