### REPORT

[To accompany H.R. 9417]

The Committee on Appropriations, to which was referred the bill (H.R. 9417) making appropriations for the Department of the Interior and related agencies for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1972, and for other purposes, reports the same to the Senate with various amendments and presents herewith information relative to the changes recommended:

## SUMMARY OF BILL

Estimates totaling \$2,385,231,035, which includes new obligational authority and amounts necessary to liquidate contract authorization, were considered by the committee for the programs and activities of the agencies and bureaus of the Department of the Interior—except the Alaska Power Administration, the Southeastern Power Administration, the Southwestern Power Administration, the Bonneville Power Administration, the Bureau of Reclamation, and research on underground electric transmission—and the following related agencies:

Forest Service (Department of Agriculture).

Commission of Fine Arts.

Indian Health Service, Health Services and Mental Health Administration (Department of Health, Education, and Welfare).

Indian Claims Commission.

National Capital Planning Commission.

National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities.

Smithsonian Institution.

National Gallery of Art.

Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial Commission.

National Council on Indian Opportunity.

Federal Metal and Nonmetallic Mine Safety Board of Review.

The committee recommends appropriations totaling \$2,417,554,035 (\$1,824,431,035 for definite appropriations, \$401,467,000 for indefinite appropriations of receipts, and \$191,941,000 to liquidate contract authorizations) for the programs and activities of these agencies. The sum recommended by the committee is an increase of \$32,608,000 over the budget estimates considered, an increase of \$67,694,000 over the sums included in the House bill, and an increase of \$150,213,135 over the appropriations for fiscal year 1971.

It is estimated that the agencies included in this bill will produce \$1,015,443,395 in receipts during fiscal year 1972.

There is a budget estimate which was sent to Congress too late for proper consideration by either the House Committee on Appropriations or by this Committee amounting to \$17,326,000. A part of this estimate is dependent on enactment of substantive legislation which has been introduced but on which no action at all has yet been taken. The Committee has not included any of this estimate in this bill, but will consider it when the first bill to make supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 1972 is before the Senate.

In addition to hearing witnesses from the government agencies, the Committee heard all Members of Congress and public witnesses who indicated a desire to appear before the Committee. As a result of these hearings and of numerous communications, the Committee considered, in addition to the budget estimates, 385 proposed amendments, which, if all had been approved, would have increased this bill by almost \$600,000,000, or over 26 percent. Fifty-five Senators proposed 258 of these amendments.

The Committee recommends the following reductions in the budget estimates:

\$550,000—North Alaska Land Use Plan.

\$1,000,000—Alaska pipeline inspection.

\$4,600,000—Fire fighting.

The Committee will again consider a request for funds for the North Alaska Land Use Plan when the State of Alaska has agreed to make a reasonable financial contribution to the cost of the plan.

A recommendation to reduce the request for Alaska pipeline inspection is made because a determination may not yet be made with respect to this line during the coming fiscal year. In fiscal year 1971 only \$1,400,000 were obligated for this purpose. The Committee's recommendation would provide \$1,045,000 to continue inspection activities.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$4,627,000, which is the same as the House allowance and \$197,000 over the budget estimate.

The Committee's recommendation includes \$197,000 allowed by the House of Representatives for recreation facilities on the Indian Creek Reservoir, Alpine County, California.

#### PUBLIC LANDS DEVELOPMENT ROADS AND TRAILS

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$3,200,000, the same as the House allowance and the budget estimate for liquidation of contracts for construction of roads on the public domain.

The Committee recommends an indefinite appropriation of 25 percent of the gross revenues from the revested Oregon and California grant lands for construction and acquisition, forest development and protection, and operation and maintenance on the revested lands and on other Federal lands in the Oregon and California land-grant counties of Oregon. It is estimated that the appropriation will amount to \$19,000,000 in fiscal year 1972.

The Committee recommends an indefinite appropriation estimated at \$2,514,000 to be derived from public lands and Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act lands grazing receipts for the construction, purchase, and maintenance of range improvements.

#### BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS

In addition to \$437,129,500 which the Committee recommends for direct appropriation to the Bureau of Indian Affairs in this bill, it is estimated that more than \$391,800,000 will be available from other Federal agencies (exclusive of social security and veterans benefits) in the coming fiscal year. The following table sets forth these sums for fiscal years 1970 through 1972:

The estimate shown above for fiscal year 1972, plus the amount recommended by the Committee, will provide about \$1,735 per capita for the 477,500 Indians under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Indian Affairs living on or near reservations. This compares with \$1,400 per capita recommended by the Committee in fiscal year 1971.

## EDUCATION AND WELFARE SERVICES

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$274,662,000 for education and welfare services. This is \$1,175,000 more than the House allowance and \$2,941,000 over the budget estimate. The Committee recommendation is summarized in the following table:

The Committee recommends a decrease of \$500,000 in the amount recommended for Indian participation in the education program. There will still be available \$1,896,000, \$1,000,000 more than was provided in fiscal year 1971. It is also recommended that the \$50,000 budgeted for the alcoholism program not be allowed. This is a program which is carried on by the Indian Health Service and is generously provided for at another place in this appropriations bill. In addition, the Committee proposes concurrence with the House disallowance of \$234,000 of the amount requested to meet increased pay costs.

The Committee does recommend unbudgeted increases of \$3,725,000 to be distributed as follows:

\$25,000 for law and order work on the Wind River Reservation, Wyoming.

\$550,000 for adult vocational training. It is the desire of the Committee that there be a total available of not less than \$1,850,000 for operation of the vocational training center at Bismarck, North Dakota.

\$1,894,600 for emergency housing for California rural Indians.

\$50,000 for higher education services for the Navajos to be disbursed through a Johnson-O'Malley contract with the Navajo Community College.

\$100,000 for additional legal, medical and nursing scholarships.

\$1,105,400 for renovation of Indian housing.

The Committee recommends that not more than \$50,000 of available funds be used for purchase of plastic teaching aids.

For resources management the Committee recommends an appropriation of \$71,667,000 which is \$199,000 less than the allowance of the House of Representatives, and \$5,024,000 under the budget estimate. The following table indicates the distribution of the Committee's recommendations on the activities under this heading:

The Committee recommends increased appropriations of \$441,000 for a study to determine the rights of Oklahoma Indians in the Arkansas riverbed; and \$75,000 for the Youth Work-Learn program.

The Committee recommends a reduction of \$540,000 in the amount proposed for fire suppression and emergency rehabilitation. This will leave an appropriation of \$800,000 compared to the \$140,000 which has been appropriated for this purpose during each of the past several years.

Also, the Committee proposes a reduction of \$100,000 in the amount requested for tribal operations. This is about one-half of an increase proposed to keep pace with Indian Claims Commission awards to be adjudicated by April 10, 1972. Testimony before this Committee indicated that the Indian Claims Commission could not possibly close out its business within the statutory time limit. A further reduction of \$4,900,000 is recommended inasmuch as the Indian Business Development Fund, for which this amount was requested, is not authorized by law.

It is the Committee's desire that any funds used for unbudgeted soil and moisture work shall be net savings from other budgeted soil and moisture programs which have been completed.

#### CONSTRUCTION

The Committee proposes an appropriation of \$43,055,500 for construction by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. This is \$5,849,500 more than the allowance of the House of Representatives, and \$6,670,500 over the amount of the budget estimate.

In addition to the projects included in the budget estimate the Committee proposes the following additional amounts for construction:

\$1,310,000—Gymnasium, Stewart Indian School, Nevada.

\$175,000—Continuation of construction on the Indian irrigation project, Duck Valley Indian Reservation, Nevada.



\$100,000—Advance planning of a day school, Fort Totten Reservation, North Dakota.

\$2,728,500—School facilities, East Charles Mix School District 102, Wagner, South Dakota.

\$163,000—Plans and design of a school for handicapped Indian children, Chinle, Arizona.

\$1,048,000—Additional school facilities, Rocky Boy Reservation, Montana.

\$240,000—Planning, Environmental Health Building, Haskell Indian Junior College, Kansas.

\$85,000—Temporary gymnasium, Busby, Montana.

The Committee directs that the Bureau of Indian Affairs investigate the need for facilities for educating Indian children in Browning, Montana, and report to the Committee its recommendations for providing adequate structures and equipment.

In addition, the Committee concurs with the following unbudgeted additions allowed by the House of Representatives:

\$387,000—Rehabilitation of drought-stricken area on the Papago Reservation, Arizona.

\$200,000—Water exploration.

\$234,000—Sanitation facilities for in-lieu fishing sites along the Columbia River.

\$200,000—Planning funds for a high school at Rough Rock, Arizona.

Also the Committee recommends agreement with the House disallowance of \$200,000 for major alterations and improvements.

#### ROAD CONSTRUCTION

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$25,600,000 to meet the contract liquidation obligations of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in fiscal year 1972. This is \$600,000 more than the allowance of the House of Representatives and the budget estimate.

The increase over the budget estimate will provide \$600,000 for a road from the Pyramid Lake Reservation to the Washoe County Park, Nevada.

The Committee is concerned that many isolated reservation areas still remain unconnected by adequate roads (such as Route 9, Crownpoint-Torreon Road in New Mexico), and recommends that Office of Management and Budget release obligational authority for such purposes.

The Committee concurs with the House of Representatives and recommends an appropriation of \$6,057,000 for general administrative expenses of the Bureau of Indian Affairs for the coming fiscal year.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$16,173,000, the same as the budget estimate and the House allowance, for tribal funds in fiscal year 1972.

The Committee recommends an appropriation of \$3,949,000 which is \$50,000 less than the budget estimate and the House allowance. The reduction denies funds for grants to candidates for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy.

For an undisclosed reason the Nationwide Outdoor Recreation Plan of 1968, for which publication funds were first provided in fiscal year 1968 and again in fiscal year 1969, has not been published. Inasmuch as another plan is now in process of preparation and is scheduled for publication in 1973, publication of the first plan at this time seems unnecessary. The Committee, therefore, directs that the 1968 plan not be published and that remaining funds heretofore provided for its publication be returned to the Treasury of the United States.

The Committee recommends increases of \$13,000,000 over the House allowance for the Forest Service to make the amount for that agency \$32,652,000, and also recommends that the amount for the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife be \$4,988,000, an increase of \$3,000,000 over the allowance of the House of Representatives.

The Committee directs that funds provided in this bill for acquisition by the Forest Service of recreation land in the Spruce Knob-Seneca Rocks National Recreation Area, West Virginia, shall not be available for such acquisition by means of a declaration of taking or by any con-

Recently, departmental responsibilities for the administration of Territories and the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands were re-assigned to the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Public Land Management. A new Deputy Assistant Secretary for Territorial Affairs position was created. The amount recommended will provide for 15 of the 17 employees proposed for assignment to the Office of the Assistant Secretary, but does not include a Territorial Officer for the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico or an assistant to the Deputy Assistant Secretary, and reduces the request for travel funds by \$17,000.

The Committee does not concur in the proposal that the Department of the Interior finance the President's personal representative and his staff for the purpose of negotiating the future status of the Trust Territory. This is more properly the responsibility of the Department of State, even though in the past these negotiations have been carried on by the Assistant Secretary for Public Land Management, whose staff has not been reduced.

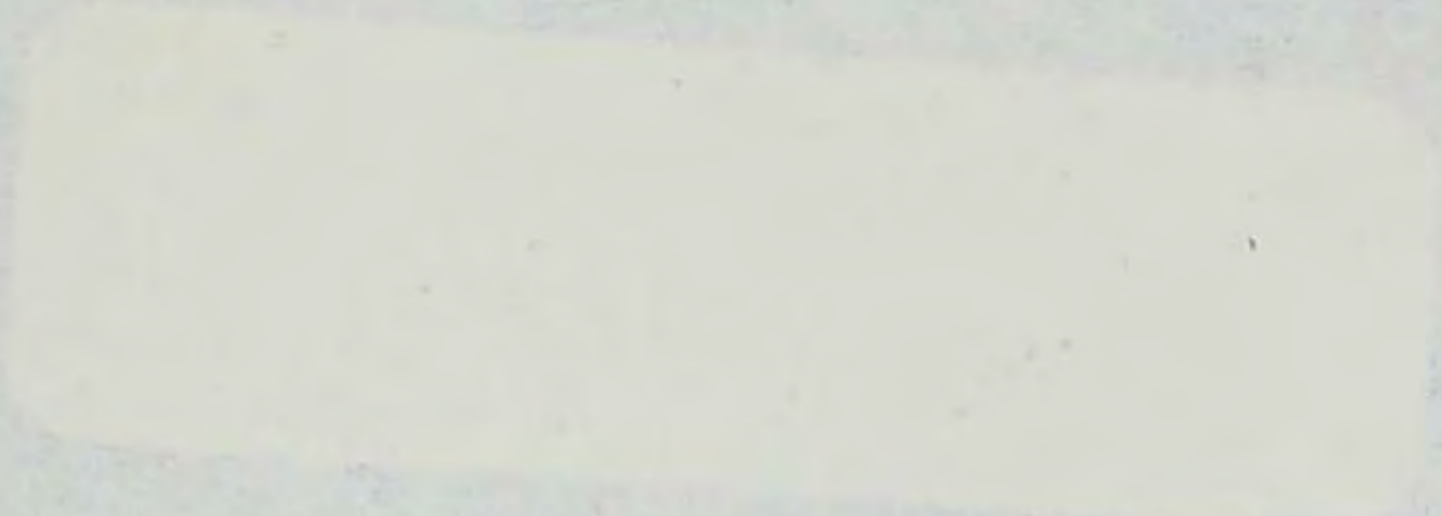
