DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH SERVICE

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

RESEARCH

The committee recommends an additional appropriation of \$3,109,000 for increased pay costs for the Agricultural Research Service under the appropriation item of "Research." The amount recommended is the amount requested in the supplemental estimate transmitted in House Document 80, and is an increase of \$249,000 over the amount recommended by the House.

PLANT AND ANIMAL DISEASE AND PEST CONTROL

The committee recommends a supplemental appropriation of \$2,417,000 under the heading of "Plant and animal disease and pest control." Within the amount recommended there is \$1,767,000 for pay act costs, as requested in House Document 80, an increase of \$141,000 over the amount carried in the House bill for this purpose.

The committee has recommended the inclusion of \$650,000 additional appropriation for screw-worm eradication expenses.

The committee has approved the supplemental estimate of \$550,000 for screw-worm eradication costs in the Southwest. This is the amount transmitted in House Document 80 to cover "overmatching costs" from cooperative sources which were incurred in the earlier phases of the program initiated with funds provided in the Second Supplemental Appropriation Act for 1962 (Public Law 87-545, approved July 25, 1962).

The committee expects that the additional funds will not be used to reimburse cooperative sources for any administrative costs of cooperators which would establish a precedent for Federal payment of such expenses in conjunction with any of the other several cooperative control programs administered with funds appropriated under this head.

The committee has also included an additional appropriation of \$100,000 to extend the cooperative screw-worm eradication program

to Arizona and California for the balance of this fiscal year. These funds are provided with the understanding that cooperative sources will bear at least 50 percent of the expense for the production, irradiation, and release of screw-worm flies in the extended barrier zone to be established.

MEAT INSPECTION

The committee recommends a supplemental appropriation of \$1,137,000 for operation under the appropriation heading of "Meat inspection." The amount recommended is the same amount requested in House Document 80, the supplemental estimate for 1965, and an increase of \$90,000 over the amount carried in the House bill. The amount recommended is for increased costs arising from pay increases approved during the last session of Congress.

THE ALTERATION OF FEDERALLY OWNED RESEARCH FACILITIES

The committee concurs in the statement in the House committee report in regard to the application of the limitation on amounts which may be used on the alteration of federally owned research buildings. The committee agrees that these limitations can be applied to structural or physical changes in a research facility, but need not be applied to the cost of the humidity-control and air-conditioning equipment necessary, or the installation thereof, to fully achieve the research objective for which the research facility was constructed. The committee believes that this interpretation of the limitation on alterations will enable the Department to proceed promptly with the necessary alteration and the installation of air conditioning, humidity control, and related equipment urgently needed at the Metabolism and Radiation Laboratory recently constructed at Fargo, N. Dak.

AGRICULTURAL STABILIZATION AND CONSERVATION SERVICE

SUGAR ACT PROGRAM

The committee recommends a supplemental appropriation of \$6 million for payments pursuant to provisions of the Sugar Act of 1948, as amended. The amount recommended is the same as the supplemental estimate transmitted in House Document 80 and provided in the House bill. The supplemental amount provided will enable payments to be made to eligible producers on the 1964 crop for the balance of fiscal year 1965.

EMERGENCY CONSERVATION MEASURES

The committee concurs in the House action approving the supplemental estimate for emergency conservation measures, transmitted in House Document 80 in the amount of \$10 million. The supplemental funds are required to enable the Department to carry out approved emergency conservation measures to repair excessive damage to farmland caused by floods and other natural disasters in counties designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as being eligible to receive such emergency conservation assistance. Emergency conservation assistance provided under this appropriation must be in accordance with the criteria set forth in Public Law 85-58.

The committee is advised that the heavy rains which occurred in the States of California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, and Washington in 1964, together with other complications of snow and flooding conditions, occasioned the need for supplemental funds during this fiscal year. The committee directs that the funds made available in this bill, together with those made available in the regular Appropriation Act for 1965 be used to meet the urgent needs in other eligible areas throughout the United States.

Since the committee conducted the hearings in connection with the supplemental appropriation of \$10 million there have been other disasters in various sections of the country which have undoubtedly resulted in damages requiring land treatment measures to be financed under this appropriation.

The committee vigorously protests the failure of the Department of not providing adequately in its regular budget request for this activity. Farmers ought not be required to wait for several months after a disaster to find out whether they can receive some cost-sharing assistance from the Government in restoring lands damaged by floods and other natural disasters. The Department is urged to review this matter at an early date and based upon its findings to request additional estimates for fiscal 1966 and thus preclude, if possible, further handling of this appropriation in supplemental appropriation bills, together with the attendant delays which occur as a result of not having adequate funds available to deal with land restoration measures promptly following a disaster.

CHAPTER II

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

For the District of Columbia, the committee concurs in the House allowance of \$1,563,000, the additional sum requested in House Documents 80 and 114.

Distribution of the allowance, payable from District of Columbia revenues, follows:

General operating expenses, \$585,800.—This sum will provide \$478,100 for pay cost increases, \$27,700 for wage board increases, and \$80,000 for unemployment compensation payments, authorized by existing legislation.

Settlement of claims and suits, \$6,800.—The sum is allowed to pay claims in excess of \$250 each that have been approved by the Commissioners under existing legislation.

Capital outlay, \$971,000.—The amount will enable the purchase of additional land—22,000 square feet—necessary for adequate parking facilities at the proposed site, ninth and G Streets NW., of the new Central Library. The regular 1965 appropriation bill included \$2,351,000 for a site to be selected by the Commissioners, but due to rising land costs in the area only 54,000 of the 76,000 square feet planned to be acquired could be purchased. The additional sum is accordingly recommended to carry out the original proposed acquisition.

CHAPTER III
FOREIGN OPERATIONS

FUNDS APPROPRIATED TO THE PRESIDENT

INVESTMENT IN INTER-AMERICAN DEVELOPMENT BANK

The committee concurs in the House action and recommends the full budget estimate of \$250 million, the first increment of a 3-year program to increase the resources of the Fund for Special Operations of the Inter-American Development Bank. This Fund makes loans to the 19 Latin American countries for economic and social development purposes on easy repayment terms. Public Law 89-6, approved March 24, 1965, authorized a total additional appropriation of \$750 million for this Fund. The committee was advised that the balance of the authorization, \$500 million, will be requested in equal installments of \$250 million in fiscal year 1966 and fiscal year 1967. The 19 Latin American countries will contribute \$50 million annually in their own currencies during the same 3 fiscal years.

PEACE CORPS

The committee has approved the budget language which will authorize the transfer of \$1,858,000 of the 1965 Peace Corps appropriation to finance increased administrative and program support costs. This increase is required because of the increased Federal Employees' Salaries Act, increased travel within foreign countries for Peace Corps physicians, and for other purposes.

CHAPTER IV

A supplemental appropriation of \$2,874,000 was requested for payments to air carriers, to permit liquidation of contractual obligations coming due and payable during fiscal year 1965, with the statement that such obligations are exceeding the amount originally estimated.

The committee agrees with the House allowance of \$1,932,000 for the payment of subsidy obligations other than helicopter operations, mainly for local service carriers.

For helicopter operations, the committee believes that funds should be provided for payment of such subsidy obligations so long as the existing certification has not been discontinued by administrative or legislative action. Accordingly, the committee recommends restoration of \$942,000 for helicopter operations to provide a total amount of \$2,874,000 for payments to air carriers, as requested.

The committee agrees with the House allowance of \$1,560,000 additional to cover the cost of an increased Government payment for annuitants to the employees health benefits fund, as requested.

The committee recommends increasing by \$10 million the appropriation to replenish the President's fund for disaster relief for use in

major disasters to assist States and local governments, to provide a total additional amount of \$35 million. The supplemental request, made in February, stated additional funds would be required to meet the emergency assistance needed due to the extreme severity of the flood damage in the western coastal States earlier in the year. The committee believes that the more recent extended flood and tornado damage in the Midwest will require at least the additional amount recommended.

A request for \$5,500,000 for a new matching grant program was considered by the committee, in order to retire or adjust individual mortgages on homes destroyed or severely damaged in the earthquake in March of last year in Alaska, as authorized by amendments to the Alaska Omnibus Act. This matter is being disallowed by the committee without prejudice, with the recommendation that it be considered with the regular budget estimates for 1966.

Restoration of \$351,000 is recommended by the committee, to provide the full amount of the budget estimate of \$4,506,000 for construction of a building for the Internal Revenue Service at Ogden, Utah. The committee is advised that it is essential that this building be promptly constructed, and that any delay occasioned by the need to later restore these funds because of an unfavorable bid would cost more than the 10-percent reduction proposed. The Committee is assured by General Services Administration that they will not lessen their efforts to secure adequate competition before the contract is awarded.

The committee agrees with the restoration of the reductions made in the regular bill, in the amount of \$7,245,900.

Restoration of \$2,835,000 is recommended by the committee, to provide the total amount of \$4,166,500 additional requested for operating expenses of the Federal Supply Service. The committee is advised that the amount restored is needed to provide for additional staff and other expenses required because of increases in sales of supplies, primarily to the Department of Defense, as well as for the development of automotive safety standards under the authorization enacted last year.

The committee recommends inserting an item in the bill to appropriate \$5,050,000 for matching grants to States for authorized training and related activities, and for expenses of providing technical assistance to State and local governmental or public bodies, as authorized by title VIII of the Housing Act of 1964, of which \$50,000 is available for administrative expenses. The authorization is for \$10 million.

The committee recommends inserting an item in the bill to appropriate \$515,000 for fellowships for city planning and urban studies as authorized by section 810 of the Housing Act of 1964, of which \$15,000 is for administrative expenses. Such fellowships were authorized to be awarded to qualified graduate students preparing for careers in the urban public service, and the recommended appropriation would allow fellowship commitments to be made this spring to students beginning programs of study in the fall of 1965. The committee is advised that this program authorized by title VIII of the Housing Act of 1964 is intended to attract students into graduate studies in urban affairs in order to increase the supply of trained personnel and help alleviate the growing shortage of skilled urban public servants.

The committee recommends inserting an item in the bill to appropriate \$30 million additional to the urban renewal fund for the liquidation of contract authorizations. The committee is advised that currently available appropriations are not sufficient to meet the estimated grant disbursements of \$280 million, and that if payments cannot be made to communities for the grant amounts due under existing statutes and regulations, they will be forced to borrow funds to meet their immediate needs for working capital.

The committee believes that there is no certainty that the amount recommended for reduction will be required this fiscal year and any additional annual contributions requirements can be carried forward into 1966 if necessary.

The committee agrees with the House allowance of \$7,745,000, the full amount requested for general operating expenses, including \$4,936,000 to cover costs of pay increases and \$2,809,000 to administer new laws passed last year relating to insurance, educational assistance, and pension programs.

An increase of \$42 million is recommended by the committee, to provide a total amount of \$150 million for compensation and pensions, in compliance with the request contained in Senate Document 18 to

meet the additional cost in compensation and pensions programs of increases in the number of cases and in the average cost per case over the amounts previously anticipated. The committee is advised that \$25 million of the increase is required by the increase in pensions rates and liberalized eligibility authorized last year, and the balance is from unanticipated increases in benefit programs, burial claims, and vocational rehabilitation cases.

The committee agrees with the House allowance of \$76,000, as requested, for grants to the Republic of the Philippines for the medical care and treatment of eligible Philippine Commonwealth Army veterans. The new rate for the patient per diem rate is \$1.30 higher than the rate used for the original budget estimate.

The committee recommends inserting in the bill language as proposed in the budget estimate to implement Public Law 88-664, approved October 13, 1964, which reopened the national service life insurance program for certain disabled veterans, and established the veterans reopened insurance fund. Initial capital, estimated at \$1,650,000 in 1965 and \$4 million in 1966, will be made available by borrowing from the veterans special term insurance fund, and will be repaid to the Treasury with interest. Payments and all administrative costs are to be financed from premium receipts and interest income from investments.

CLOSING OF VETERANS' ADMINISTRATION FACILITIES

An amendment to House Joint Resolution 234, enacted February 11, 1965, prohibited the use of funds by the Veterans' Administration prior to May 1, 1965, for the purpose of closing or relocating any

hospital or facility, or the withdrawing, transferring, or reducing of services to veterans.

The committee was requested to extend this prohibition on the present bill, in view of the appointment of a Presidential Commission to study the proposal for these closings and report to the President by June 1, 1965.

The committee believes that such extension of the prohibition by an amendment is unnecessary, in view of the specific assurance given by the Administrator of Veterans' Affairs at a special hearing on the subject held by the Independent Offices Subcommittee on April 9, 1965, as follows:

PRESIDENTIAL DIRECTIVE

Senator MUNDT. I think I have the correct understanding but I want it cleared up. I have been in touch with the White House, and I would like to direct a question or two to Mr. Driver in that connection.

We have three elements in this closing procedure: the hospitals, the domiciliaries, and their regional service offices. And it is not implicit and entirely clear from the President's statement that this new hold order which goes to June 1 and provides this Presidential Committee adequate opportunity to make its review—and I want it so that there is no question about it—but I understand that hospitals, domiciliaries, and regional service offices are included.

Now, could you make a positive statement that would clear up any confusion about that?

Mr. DRIVER. The Senator is right, it does include all three. And we have informed hospitals, domiciliaries, and regional offices that it does.

Senator MUNDT. One other question. The old order, as a result of my amendment to the Senate bill, which was approved by the conference and the full committee, provided that there would be no closure of any of these three, no transfers or substantial reductions until May 1. Now, the President's statement prolongs this until June 1, as I understand it. But there is some ambiguity as to whether or not during the 30-day interval from May 1 to June 1 there might be actions taken to reduce or move or stop some of these services. Could you give us assurance that nothing will be done now until the June 1 date?

CLOSINGS IN STATE OF SUSPENSION

Mr. DRIVER. Yes, sir, I can. We have put everything in a state of suspension until after the committee reports to the President and he has the opportunity to act.

Senator MAGNUSON. I think instead of saying a date that you should have put on the record that it is your present intention, as I understand it, not to proceed now until this Presidential Commission reports.

Mr. DRIVER. That is right, Mr. Chairman.

Senator MAGNUSON. Now, that may be June 3 or—I think we are all in agreement here that we would like for no action

to be taken until the Commission not only reports, but we can analyze it.

Senator MUNDT. That is correct.

Senator MAGNUSON. And take a look at it.

You want to analyze it.

Mr. DRIVER. Yes, sir.

Senator MAGNUSON. You want to analyze these memorandums.

And if we can have that on the record, we could proceed with a little more clarity.

Senator MUNDT. As the chairman has said, we don't like to anticipate another situation in which the President makes a finding and it becomes a fait d'accompli, and we read about it in the paper, without our having a chance in this committee to look at it.

Senator MAGNUSON. You assure us we will have reasonable time?

Mr. DRIVER. Yes, sir

Restoration is recommended because the 37 institutes would be significantly retarded in the accomplishment of their planned programs of water resources research and training if the supplemental appropriation is limited to the \$985,000 approved by the House of Representatives. Such a reduction would result in postponing the procurement of scientific and technical research equipment essential to the initiation of planned research and training. Acquisition of that equipment could be accomplished only by use of fiscal year 1966 funds, and as a consequence there would be corresponding reduction in the amount available to the universities for salaries of the professional staff and student assistants who will be engaged in the research work planned the fiscal year 1966. Because of the planning that has already been done by the universities in preparation of their fiscal year 1965 programs, the institutes are in a position to obligate \$75,000 each by June 30, 1965. In view of these conditions, an appropriation of \$75,000 should be provided for each of the institutes not previously funded in fiscal year 1965.

The Congress last year in the Department of Labor Appropriation Act, 1965, made a substantial reduction from the budget estimate for this program, from \$411 million to \$307,906,000, or \$103,094,000. This allowance was made on the basis of the existing law, which contemplated effective July 1, 1965, State matching, with the Federal share limited to two-thirds of costs of training and allowance benefits. The approved appropriation would have been adequate had the authorizing statute remained unamended, as the committee was advised that \$20 million of the 1965 appropriation already made has been programed for use in fiscal year 1966. Under the recent amendments no State matching is required through fiscal year 1966.

The committee was further advised that the Department contemplated training costs and allowance payments of \$13.4 million for the current fiscal year out of the pending estimate. The total project cost will, however, be obligated upon the final approval of project applications by the Department, and the full amount recommended by the committee will be obligated for training programs for an estimated 36,000 persons.

The committee has added a clause "together with such amount as may be necessary to be charged to the subsequent year appropriation for the payment of benefits for any period subsequent to May 31 of the year." Such a clause has appeared for several years in the appropriation for "Employees compensation claims and expenses," a somewhat similar program in that the obligations are mandatory and cannot be accurately predicted at times. Should requirements exceed the funds here recommended, an advance would be made from next year's appropriation for the purpose, without delay in making payments to beneficiaries and without the necessity of returning to the Congress with another supplemental request.

for the abatement of acid mine drainage in West Virginia. Unforeseen delays in getting certain easements from landowners make it impossible to let a contract for the work this fiscal year and the Department requests that provision be made for continuing the availability of unobligate funds for the purpose. The committee has approved the Department request.

ADJUSTMENTS IN LIMITATIONS

There was included in the Departments of Labor and Health, Education, and Welfare Appropriation Act, 1965, a general provision, section 906, which reads in part as follows:

nor shall any funds contained in this Act be obligated for any activity in excess of the amount set forth for the activity in the schedules contained in the President's budget for 1965, except in those instances where a greater amount was specified by the Congress.

The Departments and related agencies have encountered difficulty in abiding by this limitation and the bill as passed by the House made adjustments for four accounts—defense educational activities, Office of Education; the National Labor Relations Board; the National Mediation Board; and the Railroad Retirement Board.

The committee has made provision for two additional accounts—salaries and expenses, Office of Education; and limitation on salaries and expenses, Social Security Administration. The passage and impending passage of new legislation under these two units require relief from the cited limitation in order to proceed during the balance of the current fiscal year in preparing for and carrying out activities identified with such legislation.

The work proposed at Federal expense includes only those facilities necessary to handle the visiting public without despoilment of other portions of the Arlington National Cemetery.

The committee has approved the initiation of construction of the Lower Granite project, Washington, within available funds. The committee was informed that as a result of the ratification of the treaty with Canada the firm energy requirements of the Bonneville Power Administration are considerably different than they were when the committee considered the 1965 public works appropriation bill. The committee has been advised that an immediate start on the Lower Granite project is necessary to meet the power requirements of the Bonneville Power Administration by 1971. The committee notes, however, that at the present Bonneville power rate the costs allocated to power cannot be returned within a period of 50 years. The committee expects that the Bonneville Power Administration will immediately take the necessary steps to raise their rates sufficiently to insure repayment of all costs chargeable to power. Since projects in this area were individually approved and authorized by the Congress on the basis that the costs allocated to power would be repaid with interest over a period of 50 years, the committee expects them to be repaid on that basis.

included the emergency costs of \$16 million for the recent west coast floods; \$4 million for emergency requirements which have developed in other areas; and \$2,500,000 for additional requirements anticipated during the latter part of the current fiscal year.

In view of the severity of the current floods in the Midwest it is quite obvious that the \$2,500,000 included in the estimate for anticipated emergencies will be totally inadequate. Since the requirements for additional funds to meet the current emergencies in the Midwest are not known at this time the committee feels that the fiscal requirements of this fund should be reviewed in connection with the public works appropriation bill for fiscal year 1966.

Under existing law the Corps of Engineers can utilize any funds available to them to meet these emergencies as they develop; in this connection, the committee notes that part of the current request of \$10 million is to meet a deficit in this fund resulting from the west coast floods.

The committee concurs with the House in recommending an appropriation of \$271,000 and the transfer of \$539,000 from the appropriation for "Retired pay, Coast Guard," for a total of \$810,000 as requested in the budget estimate. This request was originally contained in House Document 80, which was canceled and replaced by the estimate contained in House Document 119.

The amount recommended will provide \$215,000 to cover increased pay costs under Public Law 88-426 and \$595,000 to expand the protective capabilities of the Secret Service.

The House included language in the bill which might indicate that all of the sums recommended in title II are appropriated to carry out the programs and activities of the Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965, Public Law 89-4. There are specifically authorized projects which the committee feels should not be charged against this authorization, and the committee believes such type of project should be excluded from the authorization in section 401 of the Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

The committee considered supplemental estimates transmitted in House Document 110 for various agencies of the Department participating in the Appalachian regional development program which was authorized by Public Law 89-4, approved March 9, 1965.

Exclusive of the Forest Service, the supplemental estimates totaled \$34,355,000 and the committee has recommended the appropriation of \$29,635,000 which is an increase of \$5,550,000 over the amount included in the House bill for these activities and programs and is \$4,720,000 under the budget estimates.

There appears below a description of the amounts considered and recommended for each of the several items in connection with the Appalachian regional development program.

The committee recommends a supplemental appropriation of \$200,000. This is an increase of \$100,000 over the House bill and is \$320,000 under the supplemental estimate. The committee was advised by the Department of Agriculture that the fruit industry in the northeastern Appalachian fruit belt has serious production and economic problems to solve if it is to continue as a profitable enterprise for the region. There is particular promise for an expanded berry industry with the development of new and better varieties for the region. Included in the amount appropriated for the Agricultural

Research Service is \$80,000 for planning for a fruit and berry laboratory in Appalachia. The Department is directed not to proceed with this laboratory until assurances have been furnished by State or local authorities that the necessary lands for the laboratory and experimental purposes will be furnished to the Federal Government without charge.

The departmental officials state that there is a backlog of 26 unfunded applications for loans for small watersheds in the Appalachian region totaling \$6 million. Acceleration of the program financed under this appropriation will stimulate employment as well as to improve opportunities for agriculture and for other purposes.

The Corps of Engineers has informed the committee that in view of a recent favorable bid opening on the Carters Dam in Georgia, they need only \$4 million out of the \$4,300,000 requested for the acceleration of these seven projects. The committee's recommendation, therefore, provides \$4 million for this purpose and the budget estimate for the remaining items.

The committee has recommended the full amount of the revised request of the Corps of Engineers for construction in the Appalachian area in spite of the fact that the remaining basin authorizations in the Ohio River Basin and in the West Branch of the Susquehanna River Basin are inadequate to meet the continuing contract commitments and other requirements during fiscal year 1966. In this connection, the committee has been informed by the Corps of Engineers that it will not be possible to award any new contracts in those basins in fiscal year 1966 if additional monetary authorization is not provided. The committee recommends the full amount of the budget estimate, \$16,250,000. This is \$400,000 more than the House allowance. It is the view of the committee that the full amount requested for the evaluation study of strip and surfacing mining operations, and their effects throughout the United States, should be appropriated inasmuch as failure to develop the study fully will result in loss of available economic benefits to some regions of the country. The amounts requested for subsidence, caving, and mine fire control and for strip and surface mining restoration are allowed.

The committee recommends an appropriation of \$1,750,000, the amount of the budget estimate and \$400,000 more than the House allowance. The strip mining problem in the Appalachian region is so serious that no opportunity to correct it should be overlooked.

The committee concurs with the House in recommending \$490,000 for the salaries and expenses of the Commission and the Federal Cochairman. This amount, together with the continued availability of funds previously provided, will provide \$1,290,000 for administrative expenses through fiscal year 1966.

The Commission's responsibility is to develop comprehensive plans and programs for the economic development of the region and make recommendations for actions to be undertaken by the Federal, State, and local governments.

TITLE III

INCREASED PAY COSTS

The committee recommends an appropriation of \$583,117,633 for increased pay costs in title III of the bill. This amount represents an increase of \$3,426,445 over the House bill and this increase is exclusively for Senate items, including \$50,000 for Senate office buildings, customarily omitted from the bill in the House. The budget estimate for Senate items was reduced by the committee by \$600,000.

This absorption of increased pay cost is made possible in the current year by a less than full use of senatorial clerk hire allowances, permitting a reduction of \$500,000 in the request for salaries, officers, and employees, in the administrative and clerical assistance to Senators area. The committee reaffirms the policy of absorbing related salary costs (agency contribution for employee benefits and longevity compensation) in this appropriation. In addition, the sum of \$138,000 in these costs attributable to the Salary Reform Act of 1964 were absorbed and were not included in the estimates. The committee notes that the total annual absorption of these costs is now approximately \$1,250,000.

A further reduction of \$100,000 is recommended in the estimate submitted of \$501,630 for the appropriation, "Inquiries and investigations," since this appropriation is based on the rate of expenditure of authorizations and the 9-month review of this item indicates the current year need to be less than that estimated.

Title III of the bill deals exclusively with additional funds required to meet increased pay costs, both military and civilian, authorized by or pursuant to law in all three branches of the Government. Some additional but comparatively minor amounts for these purposes are also included with funds under the same appropriation head in title I of this act.

In title I, the House effected a reduction of \$480,000 in Department of Agriculture increased pay costs items. This sum has been restored by the committee.

CLAIMS AND JUDGMENTS

The committee recommends an appropriation of \$31,411,444, the amount of the estimate, for claims and judgments rendered against the United States. This allowance is \$7,767,949 more than the amount appropriated by the House because claims and judgments aggregating this sum were not considered by the House since they were submitted to the Congress subsequent to House action on the bill. An enumeration of the items comprising the amount of the increase by the Senate may be found in Senate Document 19.
