FEES FOR MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES AT STRI

A number of scientific visitors do not directly use STRI facilities (laboratories, accomodations, etc.) but do use services provided by Procurement for mailing, (receive and dispatch) and obtaining of supplies and equipment, as well as other STRI services (assistance with immigration, use of telephones, etc.). In view of the expenditure of time that this involves on the part of the STRI staff, we have decided to institute a flat fee schedule for these services as follows:

- (a) Use of mail address and mailing facilities only, per month......\$10.00
- (b) Use of the above plus other services*, per month.....\$20.00

These services will continue to be provided as a courtesy to invited guests and fellows. This fee will be applied as of September 1, 1983.

*If procurement services are judged to be heavily involved, this charge may be increased.

NOTES OF INTEREST

-The Scholarly Studies proposal by RONALD HEYER, Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History, and STRI's STANLEY RAND was recently approved to conduct a collaborative project that would result in a handbook on the "Frogs of Boraceia", the field station managed by the Sao Paulo Museum of Zoology.

-On August 8th of this year in Grand Forks, North Dakota, The Organization of Tropical Studies and the University of Chicago Press will be celebrating the publication of the book Costa Rican Natural History, as well as the twentieth anniversary of OTS.

-As part of a seminar on the applications of mathematics for biology students, STRI's EGBERT LEIGH will be giving a lecture at the Escuela de Biología, UNIVERSIDAD DE PANAMA on Friday, July 29th at 11 am. Dr. Leigh will be speaking on theoretical biology.

-A Wildlife Propagation Center was recently established by RENARE at the PARQUE NACIONAL SOBERANIA to stabilize the populations of Panama's endangered species. Two harpy eagles, male and female off course, (the harpy eagle is Panama's national bird), on loan from the zoo at the President Remon's Hippodrome were the first endangered species to have been moved to the center.
