NOTES OF INTEREST

-STRI has received an award from the James Smithson Society in the amount of \$25,000 to support a pilot project for education and research directed at the recovery and improvement of deforested areas in the west bank of the Panama Canal.

-During their recent meetings, CIDA (Congres International d'Arachnologie) elected STRI's MICHAEL ROBINSON as vice-president of their organization. CIDA was the association organizing the IX International Congress of Arachnology.

-If you happen to be in the Washington, D.C. area, you can go see the new exhibition: "M*A*S*H: BINDING UP THE THE WOUNDS" that opened at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History on July 30 and will/ continue through September 30, 1984. The exhibition features two sets, other equipment, props and costumes from the 20th Century-Fox award-winning television series M*A*S*H, that was aired on national television for 11 seasons and completed production in February 1983. Rooted in the 1950's, the show presented issues, conflicts and attitudes prevalent during the 1970's and 1980's, from feminism to the Vietnam War and Watergate. Its central theme remained "the worth of an individual within a world of arbitrary authority and needless pain and death". The Smithsonian's National Museum of American History is devoted to the collection, care and study and exhibition of objects which reflect the experience of the American people.
