Expected to arrive this week is Dr. Lissy Coley, University of Chicago, to conduct preliminary studies in relation to her Smithsonian Postodoctoral Project: "Variation in the physiology of leaf development among species of tropical trees and vines and its relationship to herbivory". She will be at Gamboa until the end of December.

Leaving this week is Bruce Alexander who will be returning to Great Britain after having spent three months at STRI.

NEWS ON HAWK MIGRATION

Hawk migration has been unprecedented this year---two weeks early and in incredible numbers. Neil Currie, from the Taft School in Connecticut and a long-time hawk buff has followed the migration down to Panama making stops throughout the route. He will be here until the end of this month when the skies will be dominated by Swainson's Hawks (on their way to Argentina) and Turkey Vultures.

On any sunny day with slight northerly to westerly breezes, the hours from 9:00 to 11:30 a.m. are best to observe the hawks from Ancon Hill. Neil Currie observed some 35,000 hawks from the Administration Building. Currie remarks that "Nothing equals Panama".

Richard Foster from the BBC took shots of the migrations from the ground and from the air. This will be in a BBC film "Life in Air". He will return on October 25 to shoot the Swainson and Turkey movement. The full film will be put on video cassette and made available to local t.v. stations and other interested groups.
